NORTH WOODSIDE COMMUNITY CENTRE PARK PLAN

The North Woodside Community Centre Park is an important park that serves the recreation needs of several community neighbourhoods and operates as a community hub alongside the North Woodside Community Centre. Last year, Regional Council approved initiating a park planning process to evaluate how the park could be improved, made more accessible, and safer for park users of all ages and abilities.

There is currently no long-term guidance for new and upgraded facilities, where pathways and lighting should be improved, or how conditions like drainage should be resolved.

BUDGET 2025/26

After a challenging three months reviewing each department's budget, Regional Council has approved the 2025/26 municipal budget.

The residential tax rate will remain unchanged at 0.770. With increased property assessment values, the average residential tax bill (including provincial contributions and mandatory tax) will increase by 5.2 per cent – or approximately \$117 annually for the average household. BUS STOP UPGRADES

Staff are planning to complete several bus stop upgrades in District 3 in the 2025 construction season.

They will be moving the bus stop at 144 Baker Drive 7 km to the south to accommodate a new crosswalk and the installation of concrete bus pad between the existing sidewalk and curb. We have also begun installing concrete bus pads and sidewalk connections on Caldwell Road at 1720 Birchill Drive, 1622 Caldwell Road, 1682 Caldwell Road at 386 Cow Bay Road. SHORE ROAD BUILDING WITH NATURE PROJECT UPDATE



The Shore Road: Building with Nature project detailed design phase is nearing completion. We are currently in the process of securing regulatory approvals from both federal and provincial authorities before the project can be tendered.

This project involves the construction of a naturebased approach for erosion mitigation along a 480 m stretch of Shore Road in Eastern Passage. This approach consists of a new slope with native vegetation, a cobble beach and a submerged breakwater to dissipate wave energy. You can find out more about the project on our <u>website</u>.

DARTMOUTH COVE UPDATE

Staff have been reviewing the feedback for potential changes to the planning regulations for water lot development and in filling at Dartmouth Cove and are working on a report to return to Council this summer or early fall. The changes would include:

- Limiting water lot infilling activities in Dartmouth Cove to public uses and limited shoreline protection.
- 2. Requiring a development permit for any water lot infilling activity in Dartmouth Cove.
- Designating and zoning water lots in Dartmouth Cove as "Water Access," limiting the uses of infilled water lots to boating club uses; conservation uses; park uses; water access structure uses; historic sites or monument uses; temporary construction uses and utility uses.

NS POWER CYBER INCIDENT UPDATE

Nova Scotia Power continues to investigate a cyber incident that has impacted certain IT systems in their network.

While the investigation remains ongoing, they have determined that on or around March 19, 2025, certain customer information stored on the impacted servers was accessed and later taken by an unauthorized third party. Notifications are in the process of being mailed to impacted account holders, which includes detailed information about resources and support. Any customer who receives a letter in the mail from Nova Scotia Power will be provided with a phone number to call with any questions and to activate their two-year subscription for credit monitoring. They are working with external cybersecurity experts to determine the scope of the impact and safely and securely restore and rebuild their impacted systems.



In November 2021, HRM Solid Waste Resources began enforcement of new illegal dumping regulations. Municipal staff enforce enhanced measures related to illegal dumping and litter, including in parks. The Eastern Passage Community Fridge & Pantry 2.0 is now open! They have officially transitioned the Community Fridge into a brand-new fridge and pantry building, located directly next to the original shed. The new setup has two separate doors — one for the fridge

and one for the pantry — making it easier for everyone to find what they need or drop off donations.

The original shed will now be used for food storage, sorting, and garden equipment as we continue to grow our programs.

TICK CHECKS

As we spend more time outdoors, it's important to be aware of ticks and how to protect yourself. Ticks can be found in wooded areas, tall grass, and shrubs even in urban parks and backyards.

To reduce your risk:

- Wear light-coloured clothing to spot ticks more easily
- Tuck pants into socks and shirts into pants
- Do a full body check after being outdoors on yourself, children, and pets
- Shower within two hours of coming inside

The Halifax Regional Municipality is planning for the development of new active transportation facilities to support people walking, rolling and bicycling in Woodside and Shearwater. A key goal is to connect the Dartmouth Waterfront Trail to the Shearwater Flyer Trail.

We hosted a public engagement session and published a survey in April and staff are reviewing the public feedback now and will provide recommendations to Regional Council for the next steps. For more information on this project, visit our website.

OFF HIGHWAY VEHICLE SAFETY

Off-Highway Vehicles can be a great way to get outdoors and explore our trails if used responsibly. Off-Highway Vehicles are governed by the provincial Road Trails Act and the Off-Highway Vehicles Act and our municipal By-Law R-500 Respecting the designation of Road Trails on Municipal Highways. Vehicles that are operating outside these provisions can face fines and jeopardize the safety of operators and others. If you see potentially unsafe behaviors happening near you, please contact the Department of Natural Resources and Renewables (DNRR) at 1-800-565-2224. They will work closely with police to review any trends and problem areas and can provide the data for enforcement action. If there is an immediate risk to public safety, call the police non-emergency line to report.



The Halifax Regional Municipality will be working on the installation of new crosswalks with rectangular rapid flashing beacons (RRFBs) and curb extensions (bump outs) on Baker Drive at Coldstream Run and Lindenwood Terrace.

The proposed work will involve excavation in the street, intersection corners, and boulevard to construct the curb extensions, install signage, and bring pedestrian ramps to current accessibility standards and will aim to improve road safety at these intersections. BURNING RESTRICTIONS TOOL

Wildfire risk season in Nova Scotia runs from March 15 to Oct. 15. To protect our communities and prevent wildfires, the Halifax Regional Municipality has launched Before You Burn, a new online tool that provides residents and visitors with up-to-date information on whether burning is allowed in the region.

Before starting an open-air fire, check Before You Burn for clear information on what's allowed at your address, details about burning types and a easy to read map. If burning is permitted, follow these safety guidelines:

- Never leave your fire unattended unattended fires can spread quickly and become dangerous.
- Completely extinguish your fire douse it with water, stir the ashes and repeat until everything is cool to the touch.

Both the Province of Nova Scotia and the municipality have burning restrictions in effect. The new Before You Burn tool displays the burning restrictions in effect across the municipality by comparing municipal by-laws and provincial legislation with live data from the provincial fire restrictions webpage. WOODSIDE PARK ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION

The Halifax Regional Municipality is planning changes for some Dartmouth residential streets that have fast moving vehicle traffic that will aim to improve safety and accessibility for people biking, walking and rolling. The project will develop designs for these streets based on public input, engineering guidelines and traffic data and identify additional street and sidewalk improvements throughout the area including needed connections.

HALIFAX TRANSIT HYDROGEN BUS DEMONSTRATION PROJECTS



Halifax Regional Council has approved funding to support the dual-fuel (hydrogen/diesel) bus demonstration project.

The Halifax Transit Hydrogen Bus Demonstration project is a forward-thinking initiative that aims to evaluate the potential of hydrogen in decarbonizing our transit fleet. It entails converting four of Halifax Transit's diesel buses to dual-fuel (hydrogen/diesel) systems to operate on regular Halifax routes, providing valuable real-world data on performance, efficiency and operational considerations. This project, scheduled for completion in 2026, aligns with both the municipality and the Province of Nova Scotia's clean energy adoption and emissions reduction goals. Running from April 1, 2025, to December 31, 2026, the project has a total budget of \$490,000 with \$367,500 (75%) from the province and \$122,500 (25%) from the municipality. MUNICIPAL 2026-2030 STRATEGIC PLAN

The municipality's administration has started creating the 2026-2030 Strategic Plan and Regional Council has approved the proposed approach in finalizing the Plan.

The Strategic Plan reflects the municipality's vision, mission and values – and establishes key areas of focus now and into the future. The four-year plan outlines priorities and goals, which guide how the municipality tracks progress and aligns business plans and budgets. The plan also helps municipal employees understand how their work fits into the long-term goals of the organization, and how they can work together to make a difference in the region.

The draft Plan content has been informed by the results of the <u>2024 Resident Survey</u> and workshops with Regional Council and the administration's senior leadership.

Beginning in May, Regional Council will review the draft plan. This feedback will then inform a subsequent round of working group meetings and plan development in advance of the final Plan being presented to Regional Council in summer 2025.

DOWNTOWN DARTMOUTH HERITAGE DISTRICT

At the Tuesday, May 13 meeting, Regional Council voted to advance plans for a Heritage Conservation District (HCD) in Downtown Dartmouth by accepting a staff background study and initiating public consultation.

The recommendation, brought forward by the Heritage Advisory Committee, highlights the area's unique historic character — including its 1750 street grid, harbour views, and heritage buildings like Quaker House and Christ Church.

Council approved two key actions:

- 1. Accepting the background study as the basis for establishing a Heritage Conservation District in Downtown Dartmouth.
- 2. Beginning public consultation in accordance with the Public Participation Program for HCDs, adopted by Council in 2020.

The consultation process will include multiple opportunities for residents to share their perspectives and shape the future HCD plan and bylaw. This approach ensures that development in the area continues in a way that respects and reflects its heritage value.

A final plan is expected to return to Council in 2026.

RCMP EASTERN PASSAGE DETACHMENT PLANS

During a presentation to the Board of Police Commissioners (BoPC) on Jan. 6, the RCMP Halifax Regional Detachment (HRD) outlined some of their plans for future expansion. One of the key items includes the establishment of a community office in Eastern Passage with one supervisor and five constables to staff the office in 2026/27.

The Eastern Passage area is expected to grow 20 per cent by 2033 with private housing developments planned and DND's construction of a Canadian Surface Combatant Land-Based Testing Facility at Hartlen Point; there is also the Morris Lake Expansion that has been identified through the Provincial Special Planning initiative to increase housing.

This new detachment would create community capacity to focus on core policing functions, providing a modern policing model that aligns with future population growth, and service delivery requirements is key to holistic public safety wellbeing. A new detachment will provide residents and businesses with the presence, access, and the ability to collaborate and problem-solve on issues of concern with police. HRD's intended outcome is to enhance service, build trust, increase the community's confidence in the police, and better meet the public safety expectations of the community.

The Eastern Passage detachment is a part of HRD's resource plan, which is to be presented to Regional Council during next year's budget. You can find out more details <u>here</u>.

YOUTH CLIMATE ACTION FUND

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FUTURE SERVICED COMMUNITIES STUDIES

The municipality is working on Future Serviced Communities (FSC) studies for several areas where we expect potential urban expansion. One of the areas we are looking at is the land southeast of Morris Lake in Dartmouth and Cole Harbour. The FSC studies are close to completion and are currently being reviewed by municipal Planning & Development staff, the results of which are expected to be released later in the fall of 2025.

The studies examined environmental conditions, land-use suitability, infrastructure and transportation needs, density targets, feasibility, and servicing requirements to support potential future development. Based on this analysis, the recommendations identify the areas that are best suited for development and support decisions on whether to proceed with secondary planning work for the study areas. They also call for the creation of a comprehensive master infrastructure plan to address transportation, water and wastewater needs, along with actions and mitigation measures to protect the environment and preserve public enjoyment of parklands.

Public feedback will be welcomed and considered throughout the planning process. As such, the municipality will undertake a public participation program that includes public open houses, online engagement, mail-outs to nearby residents, and opportunities to comment on draft plans. It is expected that this will be a multi-year effort.

MICROMOBILITY PILOT PROJECT



Shared micromobility pilot program phase 1

On May 14, shared micromobility (ebikes and escooters) launched across Halifax, with more to come!

Phase 1 of the service begins in downtown areas and will expand to other parts of the municipality over

the coming weeks.

To help improve access, discounted rates will apply automatically to trips that begin in designated flexfare zones identified as historically underserved.

ZERO EMISSION BUSES NOW IN SERVICE



Halifax Transit has officially launched its first electric buses into service, marking the completion of Phase 1 of the municipality's Zero Emission Bus Project. This milestone includes the arrival of 60 electric buses and the expansion of the Ragged Lake Transit Centre to accommodate them, along with a deep energy retrofit of the facility to meet net-zero ready standards.

The project, the first of its kind in Atlantic Canada, aligns with municipal, provincial, and federal climate goals, including those outlined in HalifACT, the municipality's climate action plan. It was made possible through a \$112 million investment shared by all three levels of government.

The first electric bus arrived in December 2023 for testing and training. Three buses began operating in regular passenger service in December 2024, helping staff assess performance in real-world conditions.

Planning is now underway for Phase 2, which involves a rebuild of the Burnside Transit Centre to

support additional electric buses and incorporate future low-emission fuel technologies. Another \$20.7 million has been committed to support this next stage of work.

This project represents a major step forward in modernizing public transit and reducing greenhouse gas emissions across the municipality.

IMPAIRED DRIVING STATISTICS

Halifax Regional Police charged 37 drivers with impaired-related offences in March. Eight drivers were at least twice the legal limit, and nine refused a breath test, which is also a chargeable offence.
