## CELEBRATING MI'KMAQ HISTORY MONTH


October is Mi'kmaq History Month, a time to commemorate the rich history, proud culture and important contributions of the Mi'kmaq people. In 1993, Premier John Savage and Mi'kmaw Grand Chief Ben Sylliboy declared October as the official month to recognize and celebrate Mi'kmaw culture and heritage.

Treaty Day, October 1, officially kicks-off a month of celebrations. This year's theme is *Mi'kmaw Traditional Games & Sports*.

Below are some ways you can recognize Treaty Day and Mi'kmaq History Month. Be sure to check out their <u>website</u> for more information and a full list of events:

- In honour of Treaty Day, October 1, the Mi'kmaw Native Friendship Centre in partnership with the municipality will host a traditional salmon meal from 12 p.m. to 2 p.m., with a vendor market beginning at 11 a.m. More details are available <u>online</u>.
- A church service at St. Mary's Cathedral Basilica on Spring Garden Road will take place on October 1 at 10:30 a.m.
- On October 2 at 10 a.m., attend the flag raising event at Grand Parade, which will include a reading of the Treaty Day Proclamation by Mayor Mike Savage.
- Throughout the month of October, show your support of Indigenous communities by wearing orange.

## SOLID WASTE STRATEGY REVIEW

The Halifax Regional Municipality is conducting a review of its solid waste strategy. This review will focus on strategic initiatives that need to be implemented over the next five to seven years to achieve 2030 objectives and work toward meeting 2050 objectives, including:

- Maximizing reduction, reuse, and recycling of waste resources
- Maximizing environmental and fiscal sustainability of the waste program
- Fostering public stewardship and conservation
- Aligning with <u>HalifACT goals</u> (new)
- Contributing to the <u>2022 Environmental</u> <u>Goals and Climate Change Reduction</u> <u>Act</u> (new)

Until October 31, residents will be able to provide feedback on the future of our municipality's solid waste system through a <u>survey</u>. The survey is focused on obtaining residents' input on the proposed objectives of the strategy review, levels of service delivery, and resident satisfaction with current solid waste services.

Several options will be available for residents to access the survey:

- Online
- Printed copies (regular and large font) may be mailed to residents by contacting 311. Please note, requests for mailed copies must be received by October 25 to allow for return mail

- Printed copies will be available for pickup at each of the municipal Customer Service Centres at Alderney Gate, Bayers Road and Musquodoboit Harbour locations.
- Solid Waste staff will be present at various events to promote and conduct surveys in person. A list of dates/locations will be updated on <u>Shape</u> <u>Your City.</u>

Anyone who requires assistance completing the survey may request an in-person, online or phone meeting by calling <u>311</u>.

This project is funded in part by the <u>Sustainable</u> <u>Communities Challenge Fund</u> – a Nova Scotia provincial grant initiative administered by the Nova Scotia Federation of Municipalities. In part, this fund supports the implementation of initiatives that avoid and reduce greenhouse gas emissions and contribute to Nova Scotia's targets for emission reduction. Through this grant, the municipality will receive up to \$306,000 towards eligible expenses associated with the strategy review (approximately 60% of the project budget).

## OCTOBER IS DISABILITY EMPLOYMENT AWARENESS MONTH (DEAM)

October is Disability Employment Awareness Month (DEAM) a time to



recognize the contributions of people with disabilities in the workforce. Throughout the month, DEAM initiatives aim to bring awareness to barriers experienced by those living with disabilities and encourages workplaces across country to create inclusive and accessible environments for all.

Did you know that 30 per cent of Nova Scotians over the age of 15 identify as having a disability? This number is expected to grow as our population ages, making the municipality's commitment to improving accessibility and inclusion across our organization, in our programs and services and in the communities we serve, increasingly important.

In support of this goal, and in alignment with the provincial accessibility framework, the municipality's Office of Diversity & Inclusion/ANSAIO developed an <u>Accessibility</u> <u>Strategy</u> that was unanimously approved by Regional Council in May 2021.

We all play a part in working to break down the barriers that exist for people living with disabilities.

## HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

#### Trick-or-treaters, parents and guardians:

• Look both ways before crossing the street but try to limit criss-crossing the street (go down one side of the street and up the other). Always watch for vehicles.



• Trick-or-treat with people from your household or your close social group – never go alone.

- Ensure Halloween costumes are bright, reflective, fit well and are warm. Consider using face paint or makeup instead of a mask.
  Carry a flashlight and stay close to well-lit areas.
- Be sure an adult checks all Halloween candy before trick-or-treaters dig in.
- Trick-or-treaters should tell their parents and/or guardians their Halloween route and when they expect to be home.

• Never enter someone's home while trick-ortreating.

#### Motorists:

• Drive slowly and be careful backing up and drive with extra caution in residential areas.

#### Homeowners:

- Keep your doorway well-lit; clear of tripping hazards and open flames.
- Give out only commercially wrapped snacks.
- Keep pets inside on Halloween.

## **REGISTRATION IS NOW OPEN FOR THE 2023 VOLUNTEER CONFERENCE**





The conference is an opportunity for volunteers to connect, celebrate, and learn relevant skills. ## **PROPERTY TAXES DUE OCTOBER 31**

The municipality invoices property tax bills to all property owners twice each year. The tax year covers the fiscal period of April 1 to March 31. The first tax bill was sent out (either by mail or e-post) in March and was due on the last working day of April. The second and final bill will be sent out (either by mail or e-post) in September and is due on the last working day of October (Monday, October 31). The first (or interim) invoice is based on 50 per cent of the current year's estimated taxes but based on last year's rates. The final invoice is calculated using the current assessment with the current year's tax rates, less the amount you already paid from the first invoice. The total amounts billed must be paid by the due date to avoid interest charges. Interest is applied daily to all outstanding taxes at a rate of 10 per cent, per annum.
