FIRE SAFETY – BARBECUES



To stay King or Queen of the grill you must include some basic "fire safety" ingredients in your barbecue recipes.

Whether fueled by <u>charcoal</u> or <u>gas</u>, barbecues are approved for **outdoor use only** – they emit **carbon monoxide**. **Never barbecue in** your garage, tent or other **enclosed space**.

Read and **follow all manufacturers instructions**.

Place your barbecue on a **solid surface** so it cannot tip over and be sure it is a safe distance **from anything that can burn** - we've all seen the results of a barbecue that was used too close to vinyl siding. Remember too that since barbecues do get very hot you need to keep children and pets away as well.

Be cautious of wind strength and direction before using your barbecue and always **stay with your barbecue when it's being used**.

OUTDOOR POOLS AND BEACHES ARE OPEN FOR THE 2023 SEASON



The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents that the Bedford and Cole Harbour outdoor pools, as well as all supervised municipal beaches, are now open for the season.

As of July 6th, the new Halifax Commons Aquatics Facility is open.

Bookings are required for the Bedford and Cole Harbour outdoor pools, and can be completed on <u>our website</u>.

Memberships for the Bedford Outdoor Pool can be purchased at the Lebrun Recreation Centre, and memberships for the Cole Harbour Outdoor Pool can be purchased at the Cole Harbour Recreation Centre.

The Bayers-Westwood, George Dixon, Isleville Street, Cole Harbour, Shirley's, Westmount, and Sackville splashpads opened for the 2023 season on Saturday, June 17th.

The municipality has begun testing water quality for bacteria levels and monitoring for blue-green algae at all supervised beaches. Testing will continue until Thursday, August 31st. High bacteria levels can be caused by a number of factors, including dogs, birds, wildlife and impacts from climate change such as high temperatures, lower water levels and decreased rainfall.

In the event of a closure due to high bacteria levels, staff will continue testing the water and reopen the beach when the results are within recreational guidelines for swimming. In the event of a closure due to a possible cyanobacteria bloom, staff will investigate the bloom and reopen the beach when the risk of high levels of blue-green algae toxins has passed.



BLUE GREEN ALGAE



Blue-green algae, also known as cyanobacteria, are plant-like bacterial organisms naturally found in many types of water systems including ponds, lakes, rivers and wetlands. Blue-green algae are naturally present in small numbers. Under the right conditions (warm, slow moving, shallow water with enough sunlight and nutrients), blue-green algae can grow quickly and form blooms. Blue-green algae can be floating on the surface or grow along the bottom of a waterbody in what is called a mat. In large quantities, some types of blue-green algae produce toxins, which can be harmful to humans and animals.

The municipality monitors our supervised beaches for fecal bacteria, blue-green algae, and other waterborne contaminants between July 1st – August 31st annually. If a suspected blue-green bloom is observed at one of our supervised beaches, the beach is closed immediately and water samples are analyzed for toxins. The beach is not reopened until analysis confirms toxin levels are within safe limits for recreation. When a bloom is reported to the province in a lake where the municipality supervises a beach, municipal staff conduct follow-up monitoring to ensure water quality is safe for recreational use.

Municipal staff monitor and report on the status of 18 beaches across the municipality. Watch for advisories by visiting our <u>website</u> and following <u>@hfxgov</u> on Twitter. Updates can also be found on the Government of Nova Scotia <u>website</u> as well.

Blue-green algae poses significant dangers to human health and the environment. **If a beach is closed this summer, do not swim or engage in any other recreational activity that may involve contact with water** (e.g., paddling). Keep children and pets away from the water. Do not drink the lake water and please note that boiling water will not remove toxins. I encourage everyone to follow beach rules and restrictions to be safe when visiting the beaches.

WHAT GARBAGE GOES WHERE?

I often get questions from residents about sorting recyclables, but also about what happens to your recyclables once they get picked up at the curb.

Where does our recycling go?

- All blue bag material is collected and taken to the Material Recovery Facility (MRF), located in Bayers Lake.
- Approximately 80-90% of what is recyclable in the blue bag is sent from the MRF to market for recycling.
- Most of the residue produced from the MRF (i.e., material that is landfilled) is non-recyclable material, including materials that should have been placed in the garbage.
- Approximately 50% of materials shipped from the MRF were transported to markets within Nova Scotia
- Approximately 80% of materials shipped from the MRF were transported to markets within Canada
- Approximately 20% of materials were shipped to international markets

How are these items recycled? Here are some examples:

- Newspaper/Writing Paper: made into products such as paper plates and paper cup holders here in Nova Scotia
- Corrugated Cardboard made into products such as new cardboard boxes, liner board for corrugated cardboard, and paper egg cartons in Canada

- Steel/Aluminum Food Cans processed as scrap metal locally and used to make new metal products
- Laundry Detergent and Shampoo
 Containers shredded into what is
 known as 'flake' in Canada and then
 used to make new plastic products
- Stewardship Programs Managed by
 Divert NS:
 - Glass Bottles some are crushed and used as aggregate feedstock for concrete here in Nova Scotia Plastic Bottles – shredded into what is known as 'flake' in Nova Scotia and then used to make new plastic products.

Despite best efforts to recycle and reuse – reduction of single use plastics can go a long way, and we are all making a collective effort to do this.
