

ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION ON SLAYTER STREET

The Halifax Regional Municipality invites residents to participate in upcoming community engagement opportunities to share their feedback on active transportation infrastructure on Slayter Street in Dartmouth.

As part of the Regional Council-approved Integrated Mobility Plan's <u>All Ages and Abilities Bikeway Network</u>, the municipality is completing a functional plan (30 per cent design) for the Slayter Local Street Bikeway and north, south and west bikeway connectors to the existing and future bikeway network.

Currently, interim bikeway improvements along Slayter Street have been installed as a pilot project to reduce vehicular travel speeds to improve the safety and comfort of people walking, rolling and cycling along the corridor. The current features include:

- curb extensions (pre-cast concrete barriers and flexible bollards)
- speed tables (asphalt and signage)
- sharrow pavement markings (paint)

The proposed features may include:

- updated signalized crossing of Woodland Avenue at Slayter Street
- updated crossings at either Victoria Road and School Street or Victoria Road and Gladstone Avenue
- traffic diversion measures designed to reduce non-resident vehicle short-cutting at the intersections of Slayter Street and Woodland Avenue, Slayter Street and Francis Street, Slayter Street and Thistle Street, and Thistle Street and Pine Street intersections.

Residents may share their feedback on the <u>survey</u>, available until June 21.

Results from the interim measures and feedback collected through the upcoming public engagement events will be used to inform the design for a permanent solution along Slayter Street. For more information, visit our <u>website</u>.

ELECTRIC VEHICLE TESTING



The Halifax Regional Municipality has partnered with Next Ride and the Clean Foundation to offer a number of free electric vehicle (EV) test drive events to residents across the municipality. During each test drive event, residents can expect a free test drive in an electric vehicle, information on electric vehicles, electric vehicle rebates, and the <u>Municipal Electric Vehicle Strategy</u>.

Registration for each event will open approximately two weeks before the event date. Residents are encouraged to <u>register online</u> to guarantee your test drive. Limited walk-in spots may be available.

DARTMOUTH FESTIVAL SERIES

The Dartmouth Festival Series is a free annual event series beginning on Friday, June 21 at the Dartmouth Ferry Terminal and will include weekly free concerts and entertainment until Saturday, August 10.

Collaborations with community event makers will bring together a diverse mix of sounds – including urban, gospel, classic rock, blues, country, acoustic and more. Children and youth entertainment will include the Mother Goose Festival, a Halifax Jazz Festival showcase and multicultural celebrations.

PORTLAND ST/COLE HARBOUR RD FUNCTIONAL PLANNING STUDY

The Halifax Regional Municipality is inviting residents to provide their feedback on the Portland Street – Cole Harbour Road Functional Planning Study.

The municipality is planning on making incremental changes to the transportation network on Portland Street and Cole Harbour Road, from Alderney Drive and Prince Albert Road to Bissett Road over the next few years. A study has been undertaken to develop a future vision for this area that seeks to provide high quality multi-modal transportation options, including considerations like bus rapid transit, wider sidewalks, continuous off-road cycling facilities and intersection improvements. These potential changes could also improve people-moving efficiency and road safety through a lens of 'Complete Streets', which are designed to make travel safe and convenient for people of all ages and abilities.

Phase two of the community engagement focuses on the presentation of conceptual design scenarios and associated trade-offs. Feedback from the public will be used to refine the concepts and evaluate trade-offs for each design scenario. ACCELERATING ON HOUSING

Regional Council has approved amendments to legislation to support more options for housing across the region and advance our application under the Housing Accelerator Fund. The Province approved these changes on June 13.

The Halifax region has experienced unprecedented growth, largely due to an increase in immigration, and is expected to reach a population of one million residents by 2050. These changes will help respond to our growing population and the urgent need for housing among our residents.

Changes would enable a minimum of four units per lot in all residential zones within urban areas. Changes would also allow smaller, faster building, with a focus on more middle housing and more housing near transit. For more information, read the <u>staff report.</u>

ROAD SAFETY FOCUS

The road safety theme for the month of June is Distracted and Impaired Driving.

Distracted driving puts you and everyone on the road at risk. It is one of the leading causes of fatal and serious injury collisions in the municipality. From phones to loud music and other passengers (including pets), there are many distractions that can compete for a driver's attention and affect their ability to drive safely. Quickly checking your phone may seem harmless but when you find yourself needing to stop suddenly to avoid a collision, every second counts. Stay alert. RIDESHARE EXPANSION

Uber officially expanded its ridesharing platform to all areas within the Halifax municipal boundaries, enabling safe, affordable, and reliable rides at the touch of a button. Their service area in Halifax now covers everywhere in Halifax—from Peggy's Cove to the Eastern Shore. Uber Eats has also expanded to Sydney, Truro, New Glasgow and Wolfville. FUNDING FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING

\$6.1 million has been allocated from the Housing Accelerator Fund to support affordable housing projects in the regional centre. Council has also directed the Chief Administrative Officer for additional funding for project grants in the suburban area of the municipality.

Grants would support renovations or repairs to shared housing and apartments rented at below market value and grants to support new construction. A grant would support the purchase of an existing building to be used for affordable housing.

This funding will allow the municipality to support the current and urgent need for affordable housing for its residents. For more information, read the motion.

AI WILDFIRE DETECTION

In partnership with the Province of Nova Scotia, the Halifax Regional Municipality has launched a pilot program using artificial intelligence (AI) software to detect wildfires in three areas across the municipality.

Specialized cameras have been placed on provincial communications towers in Hammonds Plains, Musquodoboit Harbour and Middle Sackville. AI software monitors the imagery for signs of smoke. When smoke is detected, an alert is sent to Halifax Regional Fire & Emergency for assessment and action. The cameras run 24/7 and offer a 360-degree view of their area, enhancing wildfire safety through early detection and accuracy.

Residents are encouraged to prepare for wildfire season (March 15 to October 15), by:

- Staying informed about weather conditions and <u>fire restrictions</u>
- Planning an evacuation route
- Having an emergency kit
- Learning about the <u>FireSmart</u> program

COGSWELL STREET PROJECT TRAFFIC DEPARTMENT

Beginning next week, Barrington Street from Upper Water Street to Duke Street will experience a long term closure to facilitate work on the <u>Cogswell District project</u>.

Crews will be realigning and regrading Barrington Street, installing underground services and building a new Halifax Transit hub. Crews will also remove the last overpass of the former Cogswell Interchange, marking another major project milestone.

PROMOTING SUSTAINABLE REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Regional Council has requested that Mayor Mike Savage write a letter to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing urging the adoption of the proposed Nova Scotia Building Code Regulations.

The new regulations would mandate minimum standards for net-zero emission construction for new buildings, but the Province of Nova Scotia had previously announced a delay to the adoption of these changes. A delay in these regulations will delay the municipality's ability to accomplish our ambitious climate change objectives. These regulations represent a positive step towards decarbonizing Nova Scotia's building sector while keeping the municipality on track for its own emission reduction objectives through HalifACT. COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT STRATEGY

Halifax Regional Council has approved a revised Community Engagement Strategy that will provide a framework for the effective delivery of community engagement opportunities.

The landscape in the municipality has changed since the previous Community Engagement Strategy was developed in 2008. The Halifax region has experienced unprecedented growth over the last 16 years. A new approach to community engagement will allow the municipality to leverage technology and new methods to engage with residents to ensure programs and services meet the needs of our vibrant and diverse communities.

POTHOLES

HRM crews monitor for potholes on our roads yearround, but it's also important for residents to report potholes so that crews are aware of them and can work on getting them fixed.

When crews assess potholes, they are prioritized based on diameter and depth of the pothole and we are usually able to repair them in 7 - 10 business days. For more information, please visit our <u>website</u>.

HELPING ADDRESS HOMELESSNESS

The Halifax Regional Municipality's priority has been, and continues to be, treating those experiencing homelessness with dignity – and continuing to work with the Province of Nova Scotia and community partners to find ways to provide support to them within our organization's capacity and scope. During the June 4 Regional Council Meeting, Mayor and members of Regional Council discussed and debated the <u>report</u> and <u>presentation</u> provided by Housing and Homelessness staff.

Unfortunately, there is still insufficient indoor space for those who need to sleep rough. Regional Council approved significant funding to augment the municipality's support for those experiencing homelessness including \$750,000 for renovations to a new drop-in centre to be run by Shelter Nova Scotia at a yet-to-be-identified location. This funding will match the contribution from the Province of Nova Scotia; and \$1.8 million from the Financial Reserve to prepare the Marketplace Land and Bancroft Drive encampment location and hire additional staff for supervision and management of the encampment. This new location will have the same supports including garbage cans and collection, portable toilets, needle boxes and bottled water. Municipal staff will regularly visit this new designated location to ensure the services are adequate and to mitigate issues where possible. Municipal staff will also continue coordinating with the Province and their service providers to ensure those experiencing homelessness have access to the support they need. As part of efforts to reduce the negative impact of encampments on those who have to shelter in them as well as the surrounding community municipal staff will also develop a new code of conduct for the designated locations.

Staff will also be producing a ranked list of sites that could be used as designated encampment locations that can be used if needed and the Mayor will be writing to the province to request they provide more efficient support. PETS IN VEHICLES

With the arrival of the hot weather, Halifax Regional Police reminds citizens to not leave their pets in parked vehicles.

On a warm day, even with the windows open, a parked vehicle quickly becomes like a furnace and presents potentially fatal conditions for pets left inside. With warm temperatures expected in the forecast, we encourage pet owners to not leave their pets unattended in vehicles, even for a few minutes.

If you are not able to leave your furry friends at home, consider some alternatives to leaving them in the vehicle:

- Use drive-thrus and curbside pickups
- Bring a friend who can keep your pet company.
- Shop pet friendly. More and more stores allow pets inside

Also, as a reminder, a summary offence ticket for leaving an animal unattended in a motor vehicle in conditions that could cause distress carries a fine of \$697.50.

CAR SEAT SAFETY

With the summer season approaching and an increase in road travel expected, Nova Scotia RCMP Traffic Services emphasizes the critical importance of properly securing children in vehicles. A roadside study in Atlantic Canada found that while nearly all children were buckled in some way, 73% of car seats were used or installed incorrectly. Drivers are reminded that Nova Scotia has mandatory booster seat legislation:

- Children must weigh a minimum of 40 pounds before moving to a booster seat
- They must continue to use a booster seat until they are 4-feet-9 inches tall, or nine years old

Follow these car seat safety tips:

- Make sure your child is in the right seat for their age, weight, height, and development
- Always follow the instructions for your car seat or booster seat
- Make sure your child is safely buckled on every ride, including when travelling with grandparents, friends and in taxis

ROADSIDE GRASS CONCERNS



Each season, Parks receives service requests and complaints regarding grass cutting that are not the responsibility of the parks grass cutting program. These can be complaints regarding private property residential owners, landlords, commercial properties, and sometimes other orders of government. These service requests are investigated to validate property ownership and are then transferred to the appropriate business unit. By-law Standards Compliance Officers respond to complaints for unsightly issues on private property including the abutment property between the sidewalk and the curb.

Maintenance of grass between the street and the sidewalk & the sidewalk to a property is the responsibility of the adjacent property owner. When a complaint is received stating that the grass has not been cut, a Compliance Officer attends to the property to conduct a site inspection. If there is a violation, the Compliance Officer issues an Order providing a date by which the grass must be cut. If a property owner does not comply by the specified date in the Order, HRM will complete the work by hiring a contactor to cut the grass. The costs incurred by HRM are billed back to the property owner and form a lien against the property.

If you have concerns about unmaintained grass in your neighbourhood, please call 311 to report it.

EMERA OVAL OPEN

The Emera Oval is now open for the summer season. Residents can now enjoy the concrete surface for rollerskating, biking, skateboarding, in-line skating and more.

Free equipment rentals, including bikes, scooters and skateboards, will be available – as well as access to public washrooms and first aid stations. Helmets are mandatory for all users and are also available for rent free of charge. Valid ID is required for all rentals.

BIKE THEFTS

Halifax Regional Police is reminding cyclists to secure their bicycles following an increase in thefts in Halifax. Last month, Halifax Regional Police received 37 reports of bicycles being stolen in the Halifax area. From January to May 30, 2024, there were 68 bike thefts. Bike thefts are often a crime of opportunity and can happen anywhere in the city, but there are precautionary steps owners can take to keep their bicycles safe.

Police encourage people to keep their bike locked up, in a well-lit and well-travelled area. Take a photo of your bike and record its serial number as this will assist in identifying it if it becomes lost or stolen. Cyclists can also register for the <u>free 529 Garage program</u>, which can help reunite owners with recovered bicycles.

HRP encourages people to report their bikes stolen to police as soon as possible with as much information as possible, including the serial number, make, model, speed, colour, and any distinguishing markings. File a <u>police report online</u> or by calling 902-490-5016.

HALIFACT COMMUNITY UPDATE

NEW SUPPORTIVE HOUSING

The Department of Community Services have advised that a new supportive housing option for 35 Black and African Nova Scotians is now open in the Westphal area of Dartmouth, with service provider 902ManUp. Called the Akwaaba Reverend Wallace Smith Sr. Campus, it provides culturally responsive programming and supports to prepare residents for permanent housing.

The Department is providing \$2.3 million in annual operating costs for staffing, wraparound services, supportive programming and the building lease. 902ManUp also received about \$350,000 for one-time set-up costs.

There will also be a new option in Dartmouth available for seniors experiencing homelessness. A Pallet village with 41 units will be located at 35 Atlantic St., with support provided by Quest, a not-for-profit organization focused on support and rehabilitation. Residents will have on-site wraparound services, including meals, transportation, washrooms and laundry facilities, to help them transition to a more permanent housing option.

SEXTORTION SCAMS

The Nova Scotia RCMP Internet Child Exploitation (ICE) Unit and Cybercrime Unit are warning the public of an increase in sextortion scams targeting young males in Nova Scotia. In recent months, the Nova Scotia RCMP has observed an increase in reports of money-motivated sextortion, specifically targeting males between the ages of 12 and 20. While everyone is at risk of financial sextortion, according to Cybertip.ca, Canada's tip line, 91% of sextortion incidents affected boys.

Sextortion is blackmail, or when someone online threatens to send a sexual image or video of you to other people if you don't pay them or provide more sexual content. Sextortion typically occurs when the victim, are tricked into believing they are talking to a female online. Talk to the youth in your care about how to prevent Sextortion:

- Do not accept social media friend requests from strangers
- Avoid sharing intimate images and videos online

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- Keep electronic devices out of bedrooms at bedtime
- Monitor online activities

If someone is threatening you, reach out to a trusted adult or the police, and take the following steps:

- Do not comply with any threats
- Stop talking to them and screenshot the messages
- Never pay money or send additional images or videos
- Delete and block the offender
- Report to www.cybertip.ca and report to your local police

Remember, even though sextortion is committed virtually, it has a profound effect. Victims can feel alone, ashamed, scared, and sometimes desperate - to the point where they can harm themselves. Visit www.NeedHelpNow.ca for support and help on steps to take.
