My father, Elio Mancini served in World War II and spent 3.5 years in a POW camp.







SENIOR SNOW REMOVAL PROGRAM

There's no denying it – winter is on its way. There is a snow removal program available for seniors (ages 65 and older) and persons with disabilities to help ensure safe access to your home.

The Senior Snow Removal is a YMCA program provided in partnership with Halifax Regional Municipality, and oversees the clearing of front and back steps, walkways, ramps, and access to fuel tanks. Please note that the program does not include driveway clearing.

Those 65+ or persons with disabilities must also meet the following eligibility criteria:

- ✓ The participant must reside in a single dwelling home which is owned or rented;
- ✓ The participant, also including all individuals who live on the premises aged eighteen or older, must not exceed a total gross household income of \$32,000, and;
- ✓ The participant may not be a landlord.

The Senior Snow Removal operates on a first-come, first-serve basis. When maximum capacity is reached, the program will come to a close and individuals will be placed on a waitlist.

POLICE ASK FOR PUBLIC'S ASSISTANCE REGARDING SCHOOL BUS SAFETY

Don't forget – if a school bus has it's stop sign out it means STOP. Keep our children safe this school year by driving safely near school bus routes and school zones. It is illegal, and very dangerous, to pass a school bus when its red lights are flashing. Failing to stop for a school bus can result in a first offence fine of \$410 and six points on your license, and most importantly, it could severely impact a person's life.

GRAHAMS GROVE ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION FUNCTIONAL PLAN

Active transportation improvements are being considered for several streets in Dartmouth, including portions of the Highway 111 interchange, Main Street, Tacoma Drive, Prince Albert Road, Harris Road, and more.

The project will aim to improve safety, access and connectivity for active transportation users through improved pedestrian infrastructure and new all-agesand-abilities (AAA) cycling connections along several streets identified in the Integrated Mobility Plan and Active Transportation Priorities Plan.

Round 2 of public engagement included several open houses and pop-up events and an online survey. Feedback is now being compiled and you can find out more about next steps here.

WINTER GREEN CART TIPS

When temperatures drop, materials in green carts can freeze and cause issues for both residents and waste haulers. To avoid some of the problems associated with green cart in the winter, our Solid Waste Resources team has some helpful tips:

- Put your green cart out for each collection, even if it's not full. This will give material less time to freeze
- Line the bottom of your green cart with a yard waste bag, boxboard or newspaper
- Place your green cart in a place where the sun can reach it
- Wrap food in paper scraps

Organizations applying for acceptance into the program (or the addition of another property) must submit a complete application on or before Friday January 31, 2025.

The municipality's Tax Relief for Non-Profit Organizations Program can help eligible non-profit and charitable organizations reduce the amount of property tax they pay each year.

2025 URBAN DESIGN AWARDS SUBMISSIONS



The Halifax Regional Municipality is calling for submissions to the 2025 Urban Design Awards – a celebration of urban design excellence that occurs every two years. To qualify for an award, projects must have been completed after January 1, 2020, and meet the criteria for one of the nine categories. The submission deadline is February 10, 2025 and the award ceremony will take place on Monday, May 26, 2025. HOUSING AND HOMELESS UPDATE

The Halifax Regional Municipality is committed to treating people experiencing homelessness in our public spaces with dignity while working to find ways to best support them within our capacity and scope as a municipality.

The municipality has worked with the province to identify potential shelter village locations and it was determined that municipal land on Thomas Raddall Drive and Bancroft Lane were best suited to meet the needs of those experiencing homelessness.

Shelter villages are not tent encampments. They are staffed by trained professionals 24/7 to help residents and address any concerns and wrap around supports will be available on site for people to help them transition toward permanent housing including food and medical supports.

Each shelter has a bed, desk, chair, storage, and have both air conditioning and heat. This means open fires or fuel-based heaters are not permitted. Beyond the shelters themselves bathrooms, showers and laundry services are on site and as well as a communal meeting space for staff and residents to use.

The province and their service provider commit to being good neighbours in their community, including responding to community concerns. The Shelter Villages will be fenced and have security cameras as well as on site security. The municipality will also provide garbage removal as well as snow and ice control for the main road into the shelter village.

These initiatives, along with the tiny home project, will provide 150 new spaces for people experiencing homelessness. We will continue to work with the Province to transition people sleeping rough outdoors to appropriate sheltering options.

SHUBIE PARK CAMPGROUND TRAILERS

Last year, we did a pilot program at Shubie Campground where we opened 12 spaces for residents in RVs to stay over the winter months.

The program was a huge success and the number of spaces at the site has increased from 12 to 17 trailers.
