HALIFAX FORUM EMERGENCY SHELTER

A new temporary emergency shelter will be opening Monday, January 22 at the Multi-Purpose Centre in the Halifax Forum. It will operate 24-7 until August 31.

In partnership with the province, this shelter will offer 50 beds, increasing to 70 over the coming weeks and adding capacity based on community and weather related needs. You can find out more here.

ELECTORAL DISTRICT BOUNDARY REVIEW

The Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board (UARB) have approved HRM's review and recommendation for the 2024 District Boundary Review. These boundaries will be in effect for the October 2024 municipal election.

The new District 6 will include all of Woodlawn up to Wildwood Boulevard. It will go to Celtic Drive and Peddars Way and extend past Barry's Run and include Craigburn all the way up to Spider Lake. Dartmouth North will become part of District 5. Maps and more details will be released once the UARB final order. You can find out more about the new boundaries here.

MUNICIPAL BUDGET

The municipality's 2024/25 Budget and Business Planning process has begun and will continue until into the spring of 2024. Over the winter, municipal business units present plans to Regi onal Council with their intentions for the upcoming fiscal year and outlining the required budgets to achieve their goals. During this process, Regional Council will ask questions, discuss, debate, and consider each department's proposed priorities and budget. This can result in revisions to budget plans along the way.

During every budget meeting, members of the public have an opportunity to share their views on any aspect of the proposed municipal budget. 
WINTER OPERATIONS

Winter is here. We do our best to prepare for upcoming weather events, and have roads cleared as quickly as possible. With each weather event, crews are responsible for approximately 4,322 lane kilometres of streets. Crews also clear about 1,000 kilometres of sidewalks, 6 kilometers of protected bike lanes/local street bikeways, 11 kilometers of multi-use pathways and approximately 2,300 bus across the region.

For minor (0 to 5cm accumulation) and average (5 to 15 cm accumulation) winter events, snow clearing updates will be posted three times a day: 7 a.m., 1 p.m., 4 p.m. on our website and via @hfxgov on Twitter. For major events (15 cm or greater of accumulation), updates will be posted four times a day: 7 a.m., 1 p.m., 4 p.m. and 8 p.m.

You can help us get the streets cleared by thinking before you park. The overnight winter parking ban is in effect until March 31. The overnight parking ban may be enforced from 1 a.m. to 6 a.m. only during declared snow and ice events and when required for continued snow clearing operations. Overnight winter parking bans will continue to be communicated to residents via public service announcements, hfxALERT, halifax.ca and @hfxgov on X.

We can't control the weather or what this winter has in store, but if we work together we can all be better prepared for whatever the season may bring.

MUNCIPAL REGISTRY OF VOLUNTEER EMERGENCY SERVICE PROVIDERS

A municipal Registry of Emergency Services Providers will be created to aid in the identification and coordination of nonprofit and charitable organizations that officially collaborate with municipal staff in training and the deployment of personnel and equipment during an emergency.

This legislation also expands the type of assistance the municipality may provide to organizations accepted into the registry, beyond a grant program. The establishment of a registry in advance of Council's consideration of replacing an annual grants program with a Municipal Service Agreement model is recommended within the report to enable the integration of these new funding options. CAMP COURAGE

Camp courage is a program to introduce young women and gender-diverse youth aged 15- 18 to careers as first responders; primarily paramedics, police officers, and firefighters. The ultimate goal is that the youth will leave with a sense of empowerment and the confidence to believe that they can achieve any goal, career or dream they desire.

HOUSING AND HOMELESSNESS UPDATE

Homelessness continues to be a major challenge for our municipality, especially as we experience colder temperatures and inclement weather. The municipality is continuing to work with the province and other partners for long-term solutions for people experiencing homelessness.

Pallet Shelters



Pallet, the Province and HRM are assessing a number of potential locations in Dartmouth to determine their suitability and viability as a site for a pallet village. Pallet shelters are set up in groups of 15 – 30 shelters. Each village is fenced and has a 24/7 service provider on site to support the residents. As well as the residential units each village includes indoor washroom and shower facilities along with a support space for the service provider.

Access to heat and power

As temperatures have gotten colder, there has been an increase of fires in tents where people are sheltering outside. This poses a significant fire and carbon monoxide risk, the municipality is looking at other opportunities for heat and power. In the interim, extra funds have been provided to street navigators with the Business Improvement Districts to provide winter supplies such as winter grade sleeping bags.

Wellness checks

Municipal staff and Street Navigators will continue to visit the designated outdoor sheltering locations and various encampment locations to ensure support is provided to those who need it.

Support for Volunteers

Several groups of volunteers have formed in different locations over the past several months to assist those experiencing homelessness. In addition, the provincial 211 and municipal 311 call centres have received daily calls from residents looking to help their unhoused neighbours.

To assist with coordinating the support of these groups of volunteers, the municipality has assigned a Community Developer to provide support to the volunteer groups. This staff person will be a liaison between the municipality and the groups of volunteers, helping them to coordinate their efforts in ways that are beneficial, meaningful, and aligned with shared objectives.

Temporary emergency shelters

The Province of Nova Scotia activates temporary emergency shelters for overnight accommodation when temperatures are -10 degrees Celsius or below (accounting for wind chill) and/or snowfall amounts are 15 cm or greater.

The municipality supports the province by providing access to municipal facilities, for their use as temporary emergency shelters, as well as operational support.

Temporary emergency shelters often operate in tandem with warming centres, which are coordinated by community organizations, so those experiencing homelessness have accommodations both overnight and during the day.

ROOFTOP SOLAR PANEL INSTALLATION

The Environment & Climate Change team has begun the installation of rooftop solar panel systems at nine municipal sites across the region. These efforts support the goal to decarbonize corporate buildings by 2030 as part of the municipality's transformational HalifACT plan.

The Sackville Transit Terminal was the first site to receive a rooftop solar panel system earlier this fall, with installations expected to be completed at the following sites by the end of 2024, pending a structural analysis for some.

- Keshen Goodman Library
- Ragged Lake Transit Centre
- East Preston Community Centre
- North Preston Community Centre
- Carroll's Corner Community Centre
- Cole Harbour Place
- Sackville Sports Stadium
- Wallace Lucas Community Centre

Installation work will take place as to not impact regular operations at each site. These rooftop solar panel systems are in addition to those installed at five other municipal sites between fall 2022 and summer 2023, which included the Acadia Centre, Dartmouth North Community Centre, Halifax Commons Aquatics Facility, Kiwanis Grahams Grove Community Building and Mackintosh Depot.

Altogether, the rooftop solar panel installations are expected to produce more than three million kWh of renewable energy annually, which will save more than \$350,000 in electricity costs each year.

Residents are encouraged to learn more and participate in the <u>Solar City program</u>, which offers property owners access to innovative solar energy options and is financed through the municipality.

STUDENT TRANSIT PASS PILOT PROGRAM

The <u>Student Transit Pass Pilot Program</u> has been extended to June of next year. The program is currently available to approximately 4,300 students from four high schools and six junior high schools, and hopes to expand far beyond that pending further funding opportunities.

Thousands of students have taken part in the program to date, which has increased Halifax Transit ridership in select areas, and reduced the number of vehicles on the road to support our environment.

SAFE SCHOOL STREETS PROGRAM

Regional Council has approved a two year pilot program to encourage safer streets around our schools. The <u>Safe School Streets program</u> will include two schools and provide road closures for 40 minutes in the morning and afternoon.

Active school travel programs are designed to encourage and help students use active modes of transportation such as walking, skateboarding, scootering or cycling to get to school each day. The programming helps to promote physical activity, and also focuses on determining the safest and most accessible routes.

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
MUNICIPAL POET LAUREATE

The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents that applications have been opened for the next municipal Poet Laureate. The Poet Laureate's term will begin on April 1, 2024, and will end on March 31, 2027.

The municipal Poet Laureate is a resident poet, storyteller or spoken word artist who achieved excellence among their peers and whose work demonstrates connection with and relevance to the municipality's citizens. Acting as an ambassador for poetry, literature and the arts — the Poet Laureate attends events across the region to promote and attract people to the literary world while representing the municipality. The position is intended to broadly reflect the interests, issues and perspectives of the varied communities and individuals of the Halifax region.

The Poet Laureate will receive an honorarium of \$5,000 per year for their three-year mandate.

MONTREAL PLEDGE

Regional Council has approved the motion to direct the Mayor to write a letter of support to the City of Montréal for the Halifax Regional Municipality to become a Signatory City of The Montréal Pledge.

The City of Montréal is the next host of the meeting for the Convention on Biological Diversity of the United Nations (CBD), which is an international agreement for the conservation of biological diversity, with an objective to encourage actions which will lead to a sustainable future for human life. The CBD'S governing body is the Conference of the Parties (COP) and will meet next in two years in Montréal (in an event called COP15) to review progress, set priorities and commit to new work plans. As the host City, the mayor of Montréal issued a challenge to cities across the world to make a commitment to protecting biodiversity, also known as The Montréal Pledge.

The challenge invites cities to commit to 15 tangible actions towards pursuing and accelerating their efforts to preserve ecosystems and biodiversity in their region. Signatory cities of the Montréal Pledge are expected to demonstrate leadership and to act swiftly in order to protect biodiversity. Currently, 61 major cities from across the world have already committed to the Montréal Pledge, and Halifax is the first city in Nova Scotia to participate.

Pledging to meet the commitments of the Montréal Pledge represents a positive environmental vision for the municipality that will directly and positively impact our local environment now and into the future, building further resilience to the effects of a changing climate. 
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HOLIDAY CHECK POINTS AND IMPAIRED DRIVING STATISTICS

Last month, members of the HRP Traffic Unit, along with patrol members, participated in the 2023 Operation Christmas campaign. This annual initiative aims to make the roadways safer by reducing impaired driving and encouraging motorists to practice safe winter driving. Throughout the month, officers conducted numerous checkpoints across the region in an effort to remove impaired drivers from our roads and remind drivers of the dangers and consequences of impaired driving.

Halifax Regional Police charged 47 drivers with impaired driving-related offences during the month of December. Of the 47 drivers, 20 were charged with impaired operation of a conveyance by alcohol, four were charged with impaired operation of a conveyance by drug and 23 drivers were issued a driving suspension for operating a conveyance while having consumed alcohol.

We continue to be encouraged by the number of citizens helping to play a role in community safety. Of the 47 drivers we received 15 calls from citizens who suspected impaired driving. We thank citizens for calling in suspected impaired drivers and encourage citizens to call 911 immediately if you suspect someone is driving impaired.



FIREWORKS IN HRM

I've received some concerns about fireworks over the last few weeks. Unfortunately, HRM does not have the legal authority to ban the sale or use of consumer fireworks. The sale, purchase, use and storage of fireworks was restricted in Nova Scotia at one time. The province repealed its Fireworks Act in 2002 and never replaced it. You can find an explanation of the rules around consumer fireworks on the HRM website here. Consumer fireworks are predominantly a Federal jurisdiction, enabled under the Explosives Act and regulated under Part 16 of the Explosives Regulations.

The municipality does require permits to set off fireworks on municipally owned property. Consumer fireworks do not require a permit on private property. However, residents must abide by the burning and noise by-laws, which means fireworks may only be used during certain days and times.

If you have concerns regarding the use of fireworks including issues with permits or for animals, please contact 311. It is critical that this issue be reported and documented via the 311 process so that it may be investigated. If you witness something that is a safety concern in real time call 911 so that the safety issue can be address promptly.

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Land Acknowledgement

The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mikma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mikmaq people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People.
