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URBAN FOREST MANAGEMENT PLAN SURVEY

The Halifax Regional Municipality is reviewing and updating its <u>Urban Forest Management Plan</u> (formerly the Urban Forest Master Plan). This review will evaluate the awareness, understanding and satisfaction with the municipality's Urban Forest Management Plan (UFMP) and creates an opportunity for residents to provide their feedback on the UFMP through public engagement. A <u>survey</u> will be open until March 7.

Since the approval of the original UFMP, there have been significant changes to the municipality's planning standards and strategic priorities, including the adoption of the <u>Regional Plan</u> and the climate action plan <u>HalifACT</u>, that necessitate an updated UFMP to better align with the needs of our growing region.

Managing our urban forest ensures our region continues to receive the benefits trees offer and helps the municipality further its climate action. Since 2012, the municipality has advanced these efforts by implementing a cyclical pruning program, a tree planting program and solidifying the role of trees through the <u>Municipal Design</u> <u>Guidelines</u>.

Following public engagement, staff will review and consider feedback, draft the new UFMP and present it to Regional Council for final review and approval. For more information, visit our <u>website</u>.

MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT FOR FIRST RESPONDERS

I was pleased to work with staff to develop a motion requesting information on providing specialized nontraditional methods of care and support for employees in first responder roles to address psychological safety.

While mental health are a concern for all employees, there is an increased risk for first responders. While all permanent, full-time HRM employees have access to an Employee Family Assistance Program (EFAP), there are cases where this doesn't even scratch the surface of what is needed. First Responders with Post-Traumatic Stress Injury (PTSI) often need specialized in-patient care that relies on best practices and evidence-based treatment specifically designed for first responders.

The motion was approved at the March 5th meeting of Regional Council and I'm looking forward to reviewing a staff recommendation report to improve mental health supports for our police, fire and emergency workers.

FAST FERRY INVESTMENT ANNOUCEMENT



This week, all three levels of government came together to announce a joint investment to build the Mill Cove Ferry Service, which will include five electric ferries, two terminals and a maintenance facility.

The new ferry terminals will be net-zero – one at Mill Cove, and the other will replace the aging Halifax ferry terminal. A bridge will also be built over the CN rail line in Bedford to connect buses, cars, pedestrians and cyclists to the Mill Cove terminal.

This project aligns with the Joint Regional Transportation Agency's Regional Transportation Plan. The agency is taking a regional approach to growth by looking at the safe, efficient and coordinated movement of people and goods.

The Province will contribute \$65 million, the federal government is investing \$155.7 million and Halifax Regional Municipality will provide more than \$38 million.

SPRING WEIGHT RESTRICTIONS ON MUNICIPAL ROADS

To minimize potential damage to municipal roads, the Halifax Regional Municipality will introduce its annual spring weight restrictions, beginning Sunday, March 3 and ending Sunday, April 28.

PROFESSIONAL ARTS ORGANIZATION GRANTS

We are now accepting applications for the 2024-25 Grants to Professional Arts Organizations Program. The aim of this program is to foster broad public access to public art.

There are two funding streams: operating assistance and project assistance. The municipality now provides up to three-year funding agreements towards the operating funds of eligible groups and annual funding agreements supporting distinct artistic projects.

SEATBELT SAFETY

The road safety theme for the month of March is **Occupant Restraints (seatbelt safety).**

As a parent, you are your kids' strongest influence when it comes to modeling safe driving practices, including buckling up every time you get in the car. Teach your family that safety is the responsibility of all passengers as well as the driver.

The proper use of seat belts prevents traffic fatalities and reduces injuries. Everyone 16 years of age and older, riding in a vehicle in Nova Scotia, must also wear a seat belt. Young children must be in an approved "child restraint system" car seat suitable for their age, height or weight.

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FRAUD PREVENTION MONTH

March is Fraud Prevention Month. Every year, thousands of Canadians fall victim to fraud. Many don't think it can happen to them, but scammers use sophisticated ways to target people of all ages. The best way to fight these types of crimes is through awareness and education. Below are the top ten scams in Nova Scotia from 2023, based on dollar losses:

- 1 **Investment:** Scammers solicit investments into false or deceptive investment companies that promise higher-than-normal returns.
- 2 Service: scammers offer services such as tech support, air duct cleaning, or new cellphone service plans, in attempt to steal personal information.
- 3 Romance: Using fake profiles on social media and dating websites, scammers convince people to enter into a virtual relationship with the goal of having them send financial support or are extorted using compromising photos.
- 4 **Spear phishing:** Using what look to be legitimate email addresses, scammers try to get businesses or individuals to send them money.
- 5 Job: Online ads and fake job interviews; victims are often directed to purchase and send gift cards using fraudulent cheques.
- 6 Extortion: Scammers unlawfully obtain money, property or services through intimidation. This is also done through sextortion, a form of blackmail that involves threats to distribute intimate images or videos if money isn't paid to the fraudster.
- 7 Bank investigator: Scammers call and ask for help catching fraudulent bank employees or offer help in resolving suspicious account transactions.
- 8 Merchandise: Scammers create fake online ads online using resale sites, website pop-ups or fake company websites.
- 9 Emergency: Fraudsters prey on people's fear of a loved one being hurt or in trouble and in need of financial support. (Also known as the 'grandparent scam').

 10 – Prize: Scammers contact people claiming they've won, or have a chance at winning, a prize or lottery; the winner is then asked to pay taxes or fees related to the fake winnings.

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MUNICIPAL BUDGET

Today, Regional Council will be reviewing the last of the departmental budget presentations with continuation of the corporate services, Halifax Regional Police and RCMP budgets. The Budget Adjustment List, or items that have been requested through the process to be added or removed from departmental budgets will be discussed on Tuesday, April 2 and the final budget approval is expected to be at the Tuesday, April 23 meeting of Regional Council.

To provide your feedback on the municipal budget, feel free to reach out directly to me or attend a budget meeting to share your thoughts with all of Regional Council or submit written correspondence.

Regional Council has approved the 2024/25 Capital Budget and the 2024/25 Multi-Year Capital Plan, which are the basis for staff's planning and resourcing preparations required to implement capital projects within the current year and next three years. The operating budget is still under review as we continue to discuss each department's operating budget.

Some key projects in this budget includes the Halifax Regional Fire & Emergency (HRFE) Headquarters and Station 1, active transportation, sidewalk recapitalization, HRFE fleet replacement, Burnside & City of Lakes Industrial Park, electric bus procurement and municipal building retrofits as part of HalifACT. SUPPLIER DIVERSITY PILOT PROGRAM

The Halifax Regional Municipality is joining a provincewide Supplier Diversity Pilot Program, led by the Canadian Aboriginal and Minority Supplier Council (CAMSC). The Pilot Program aims to promote inclusive supply chains and support diverse local business owners – including CAMSC's database of over 800 diverse suppliers.

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The municipality regularly works with suppliers to deliver municipal services – including the acquisition of materials and equipment; the solicitation, facilitation, and execution of contracts for goods, services and construction; and the physical control, security and distribution of materials.

The municipality's participation in the Pilot Program aligns with the municipality's <u>Social Value Framework</u>, while also increasing economic opportunities and expanding participation in the municipality's supply chain.

DE-DESIGNATION OF ENCAMPMENT SITES

Over the past several weeks, the municipality has been taking a number of steps to provide supports to those experiencing homelessness in our region, and particularly to those sleeping rough in de-designated locations.

As health and safety conditions have continued to deteriorate, staff are working with the few remaining people to find indoor accommodations. 52 people have successfully moved out of the de-designated locations and about three remain.

At the Dartmouth North Neighbourhood Watch meeting last month, concerns were raised about the Overlook site and St. Paul's Church shelter. Please reach out to Halifax Regional Police at <u>contacthrp@halifax.ca</u> if you have safety concerns.

The municipality is aware that not all people who are currently sleeping rough will be able to go to a shelter for a variety of reasons. The province has provided assurances that those sheltering in the de-designated locations, who cannot move into indoor shelter spaces, will be offered an appropriate transitional housing option.

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For those who do not or cannot accept an indoor option, Street Navigators and municipal housing and homelessness staff are advising individuals to consider moving to the designated location at the Barrington Street green space. This location has power service available.

CHANGES TO RECREATION FEES

Parks and Recreation fees are changing on April 1. In 2022, changes to the Parks & Recreation fee structure for recreation programs, services, rentals, drop-ins and membership fees were announced. In accordance with the five-year fee structure changes, it is time to update fees again. Please see the full list of changes here.





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HOUSING ACCELERATOR FUND

As part of the Housing Accelerator Fund federal funding program, the municipality is collaborating with partners and other levels of government in a national effort to support housing. The municipality is proposing updates to planning policies to enable more density and flexible housing types in residential areas.

NEW OPEN DATA SETS

The Halifax Regional Municipality has released eight new datasets on <u>Open Data</u>, as part of an ongoing commitment to provide public access to data created and managed by the municipality. The new datasets include 2016 and 2021 census data, growth control areas and transit snow routes. The addition of these datasets brings the total number of Open Data datasets to 240.

A wide range of data can be sourced for free through the catalogue, the Open Data initiative was launched in early 2014 to help improve resident engagement and enhance transparency on municipal data. PROTECTING ANIMALS IN COLD WEATHER

With the temperature continuing to be well below freezing, Halifax Regional Police is sharing a few tips to help pet people take extra care of their pets.

Below are some tips to help keep Fluffy and Fido safe this cold weather season:

- Never leave your pet in a cold car. It can hold in the cold just like a refrigerator.
- Keep your pets indoors, during the day and night. Cold temperatures can still harm your pets even though they have fur.
- If you leave your pets outside, give them a draft-free shelter large enough to stand and turn around in, but small enough to retain body heat. Use something to protect them against the cold like a layer of straw or a blanket. Turn the entrance away from wind and snow.
- Stay with your pets when taking them out for a bathroom break; if it's too cold for you, it is too cold for them, and you should head inside.

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 Use extra caution around lakes, ponds and rivers as the ice may not be thick enough to hold you and/or your pet.

Police remind citizens that if you see an animal in distress call 902-490-5020 and take direction from the call taker.

JOSEPH BEALS



Today marks the third anniversary of the murder of Joseph Beals, and the Special Investigation Section of the Integrated Criminal Investigation Division continues to investigate the case.

On February 20, 2021, at approximately 2:10 p.m.,

Halifax Regional Police responded to reports of a single vehicle crash into a utility pole at the intersection of Mount Edward Road and Cranberry Crescent in Dartmouth. The driver, Joseph Beals, had suffered gun shot wounds. He was taken to the hospital with lifethreatening injuries where he died. The Nova Scotia Medical Examiner Service conducted an autopsy and ruled the death a homicide.

Investigators believe there are people who have information that could help solve Joseph's murder. They are asking anyone with information to do the right thing and come forward with what they know; even the smallest piece of information could be the key to progressing the investigation into Joseph's murder. Anyone with information about Joseph's murder is asked to contact police at 902-490-5020.

Joseph's case is part of the <u>Nova Scotia Department of</u> <u>Justice Rewards for Major Unsolved Crimes Program</u> which offers cash rewards of up to \$150,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person(s) responsible for specified major unsolved crimes. Callers must contact the Rewards Program at 1-888-710-9090, must provide their name and contact information, and may be called to testify in court. All calls will be recorded. The amount of the award will be based on the investigative value of the information provided.
