STREET CLOSURE – WAVERLEY ROAD

NATIONAL FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Halifax Regional Fire & Emergency (HRFE) is reminding residents that cooking-related fires are one of the leading causes of home fires and home fire injuries.

To prevent a cooking-related fire:

- Turn your pot handles toward the back of the stove and always keep a lid nearby in case of grease fires.
- Watch what you heat and set a timer to keep yourself in check.
- Keep children away from the stove to avoid accidents.

MUNICIPAL SERVICES FOR THANKSGIVING

The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents of the following municipal program and service level adjustments for the upcoming Thanksgiving long weekend, including the holiday on Monday, October 9.

The municipality is closely monitoring Tropical Storm Philippe as it approaches the region this weekend. Municipal service adjustments will be made throughout the weather event as needed and additional information will be shared as required.

There will be no garbage, organics or recyclables collection services on Monday, October 9.

Curbside collection normally scheduled for Monday, October 9, will instead occur on Saturday, October 7.

The Otter Lake Waste Management Facility and Materials Recovery Facility will be closed on Monday, October 9 but will be open on Saturday, October 7 for regular business hours.

The Household Special Waste Depot will be closed on Saturday, October 7 but will be open on Saturday October 14 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Halifax Transit buses and the Alderney Ferry service will be operating on Holiday Schedules on Monday, October 9.

Many municipally-operated Recreation facilities will be closed on Monday October 9, except for the Emera Oval, which will be open (weather dependent) and the Sackville Sports Stadium.

The 311 Contact Centre will be closed Monday, October 9 for full service. Urgent calls can still be reported.

Regular operating hours (Monday to Friday: 8 a.m. – 8 p.m.; Saturday and Sunday: 9 a.m. – 5:30 p.m.) will resume on Tuesday, October 10.

On-street paid parking will be free on Monday, October 9.

DISABILITY EMPLOYMENT AWARENESS MONTH

October is Disability Employment Awareness Month (DEAM) a time to recognize the contributions of people with disabilities in the workforce. Throughout the month, DEAM initiatives aim to bring awareness to barriers experienced by those living with disabilities and encourages workplaces across country to create inclusive and accessible environments for all.

In support of improving accessibility and inclusion across our organization, in our programs and services and in the communities we serve, and in alignment with the provincial accessibility framework, the municipality's Office of Diversity & Inclusion/ANSAIO developed an <u>Accessibility Strategy</u> that was unanimously approved by Regional Council in May 2021.

MUNICIPALITY'S EV STRATEGY

Transportation is the is the second highest source of greenhouse gas emissions in the Halifax Region. Our HalifACT team are working to encourage making the switch from vehicles powered by fossil fuels to the more eco-friendly alternatives of Electric Vehicles (EVs)

We began installing public charging infrastructure over the summer. Up to 18 sites are expected to be operational by summer 2025. Decarbonizing Transportation is an important part of our <u>HalifACT plan</u> including converting our own fleet and investing in electric buses.

We recently collaborated with Next Ride to run a series of EV Test Drive events throughout the municipality and develop a Q&A document that addresses many of the common questions you may have about EVs. Check out the Q&A and more information about the municipal EV strategy <u>here.</u>

PROPERTY TAXES

Your final property tax bill was sent out by mail of e-post in September and is due on Tuesday, October 31.

The municipality invoices property tax bills to all property owners twice each year. The tax year covers the fiscal period of April 1 to March 31. The first tax bill was sent out in March and was due on the last working day of April. The first invoice is based on 50 per cent of the current year's estimated taxes based on last year's rates. The final invoice is the remaining amount calculated using the current assessment with the current year's tax rates.

Total amounts must be paid by the due date to avoid interest charges. Interest is applied daily to all outstanding taxes at a rate of 10 per cent, per annum. For more information, please call 311 or visit our website.

RIGHT OF WAY CHARGE UPDATE

The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents that the Right-of-Way (ROW) charge (formerly referred to as the "Stormwater Right-of-Way charge") is moving back to your tax bill. The new rate will be based on your property assessment and will appear on your next bill. Stormwater is the water from rain, melted snow and ice that runs off from roofs, parking lots, driveways and other hard surfaces. The municipality is responsible for paying Halifax Water for the impact of our infrastructure on their stormwater system.

The ROW charge covers the maintenance of roads, bridges, trees, lighting, signage and guardrails, as well as for the management of stormwater that comes from the public street right-of-way into Halifax Water's stormwater system.

The municipality's ROW charge applies to all properties within the <u>municipal stormwater service boundary</u>. Halifax Water will continue to collect a separate Stormwater (Site-Related Flow) charge, more information can be found <u>here</u>. HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

Halloween – a night filled with candy, costumes and time with friends – is just around the corner. To ensure that the night is fun and memorable, Halifax Regional Police is sharing these Halloween safety tips.

Trick-or-treaters, parents and guardians:

- Follow normal pedestrian safety rules. Look both ways before crossing the street and watch for vehicles (especially vehicles backing out of driveways).
- Trick-or-treat with people; don't trick-or-treat alone.
- Avoid criss-crossing the street. Go down one side of the street, then up the other.
- Ensure Halloween costumes are bright, reflective and fit well. Confirm that costumes allow the wearer to see clearly. Consider using face paint or makeup instead of a mask.
- Carry a flashlight and stay close to well-lit areas.
- Be sure an adult checks all Halloween candy before trick-or-treaters dig in.

- Trick-or-treaters should tell their parents and/or guardians their Halloween route and when they expect to be home.
- Dress warmly.
- Watch for open flames and be careful around jack-o-lanterns.
- Stay outside while trick-or-treating. Never enter someone's home.

Motorists:

• With the excitement of Halloween, trick-ortreaters may forget pedestrian safety rules. Drive with extra caution in residential areas.

• Drive slowly and be careful backing up. Homeowners:

- Keep your doorway well-lit; clear of tripping hazards and open flames.
- Give out only commercially wrapped snacks.
- Keep pets inside on Halloween. Costumes and loud noises may scare them.

MOVING FORWARD TOGETHER ROUTE CHANGES

Halifax Transit is implementing the *Moving Forward Together Plan (MFTP)* because as our city evolves, so do our public transit needs. Service changes described in the plan are being implemented over several years and this set of changes represents another phase in the implementation of the plan.

Since 2018, 89 per cent of the total MFTP network has been implemented. As a result of these changes, ridership has increased by 8 per cent and the amount of transit service hours has increased by 11 per cent. The plan created a simplified transfer-based system, making routes shorter and less likely to be delayed by traffic. This also reduces redundancy in the network, freeing up resources that can be used elsewhere and benefit more passengers. The remaining four MFTP route changes originally planned for this year remain important to the completion of the network and will be implemented as soon as staffing resources allow.

Route 51 A/B Windmill (Route 51A: Service 7 days a week. Route 51B: Rush-hour/Peak Period weekday service only.)

The new branched Route 51 A/B Windmill replaces former Route 51 providing service between the Bridge Terminal, Bedford Institute of Oceanography (BIO), and Ocean Breeze Estates. On weekdays during peak hours, Route 51B will continue to the future Wrights Cove Terminal. The new Route 51, which will travel on Hudson Way, will simplify service to Ocean Breeze Estates and Burnside, and provide service throughout the day to BIO. Due to low ridership, the route will no longer service past Wrights Cove on Windmill Road (specifically Akerley Boulevard, Joseph Zatman Drive, Topple Drive loop).

Route 56 Dartmouth Crossing (7 days a week)

The new Route 56 Dartmouth Crossing will follow similar routing to Dartmouth Crossing as former route 56 but will extend to travel along Wright Avenue to service the future Wrights Cove Terminal. The new Route 56 will provide a better connection between Burnside Industrial Park and Dartmouth Crossing and will connect riders to bus routes that service Burnside/Dartmouth Crossing and travelling to Bedford and Sackville.

Route 72 Portland Hills (7 days a week)

The new Route 72 Portland Hills will follow similar routing from Portland Hills to Dartmouth Crossing as former Route 72 but will extend north of Wright Avenue to service growing development in Dartmouth Crossing (IKEA, Kent, etc.). All-day and late-night service will be provided on Commodore Drive, an area currently served by Route 64 Burnside only on weekdays. This route will no longer provide service on Ilsley Avenue north of Ronald Smith Avenue, or on Wright Avenue between Ilsley Avenue and John Savage Avenue.

New routing was designed in response to public feedback to address growing development in the area north of Wright Avenue. Ridership that will be missed due to route changes will be located very close to service available on Wright Avenue or Ronald Smith. Wright Avenue will now be serviced by Route 56, which allows Route 72 to use Commodore Drive to more directly access Dartmouth Crossing and provide service to that street.

OCTOBER ROAD SAFETY FOCUS

The monthly road safety theme for October is Intersection Safety. Intersection related collisions account for the majority of fatal and injury collisions in HRM. We all have a shared responsibility in keeping our roads safe by following the rules of the intersection, being mindful of other road users and weather conditions and avoiding distractions.

<u>Drivers</u>

• Make sure there is enough space between your vehicle and the vehicle ahead of you.

• As you approach an intersection, look both ways to scan your surroundings.

• Come to a full stop at stop signs and red lights.

• When approaching an amber or yellow light you must stop if you can do so safely.

• If the light is green, scan left and right before proceeding through the intersection or entering the intersection to make a left or right turn.

 Do shoulder checks, mirror checks and use signals before turning. When turning right do a double shoulder check for cyclists.

 Yield to pedestrians at intersections.
Crosswalks exist on all legs of an intersection, whether marked or unmarked.
Drivers must wait until pedestrians are completely across the road before proceeding.

<u>Pedestrians</u>

• Look both ways, try to make eye contact with motorists and walk across only when it is safe to do so.

• When available always take advantage of marked crosswalks.

 It's the law to use flashing light at crosswalks where available. Make sure to press the button where it is available.

• Consider wearing bright colours or reflective clothing when walking in the evening, at dusk or dawn and when the weather conditions make visibility poor.

<u>Cyclists</u>

• Use hand signals to let other road users know your intentions at intersections.

• If you decide to cross the street using pedestrian signals, get off your bicycle and walk it across the street.

 $\circ~$ Approach intersections with caution and look for vehicles slowing down to turn right.

 Consider wearing or applying bright colours and applying additional reflective materials or to your bicycle.

 You are legally required to have a light at the front of your bike (or e-scooter) and a red reflector or red light at the back.

• Always wear your certified helmet.

Residents are advised of the following upcoming closures in the Cogswell District, which will take place in two phases. Phase 1 from October 18 to June 2024 will see Cogswell Street from Brunswick to Barrington streets closed. Residents may detour via Brunswick, Duke or Cornwallis streets.

During Phase 1, crews will work on mass excavation, installing underground services and the construction of a new detour road that will open in conjunction with the beginning of Phase 2.

During Phase 2 from June to December 2024, a new detour road connecting the new permanent Cogswell Street to Barrington Street (north) will open. Barrington Street, from the former Cogswell Street intersection to Duke Street, will be closed. Residents may detour via Upper Water or Cornwallis streets. During this closure, the Halifax Transit Terminal on Barrington Street will be temporarily relocated.

During Phase 2, crews will work on mass excavation, installing underground services and the construction of a new transit terminal.

By implementing these closures, the municipality is able to avoid a series of rolling road closures, lane drops and other disruptive activities. Traffic modelling has been completed and the road network can accommodate these temporary changes. These closures will also allow the delivery of the new Barrington Street Transit Terminal 12 months ahead of schedule and will result in a more consistent and predictable road network while work progresses in the Cogswell District.

The Cogswell District project has a budget of \$122.6M and will be completed in 2025.
