ADDITIONAL ACCESSIBLE TRANSPORTATION OPTIONS RECEIVE SUPPORT

HRM has been working for some time to find a workable solution to provide on demand, taxi style accessible transportation. In February, Regional Council awarded SeniorsTransit Inc. with a three-year contract to provide Private On Demand Accessible Transportation Services.

The contract will have a maximum life-cycle cost of \$1,805,013 with funding from the Halifax Transit 2022/23 proposed operating budget.

Council approved the procurement of an On Demand Accessible Transportation Service with the goal of improving the financial viability of operating accessible taxi services for service providers.

The municipality will pay a fixed unit price rate to SeniorsTransit Inc. to ensure the availability of accessible transportation to the public and SeniorsTransit Inc. will charge members of the public the same fares and rates that are charged to use a taxi.

MUNICIPAL BUDGET 2022/23 UPDATE

Regional Council has been debating how to spend your tax dollars for the 2022/23 fiscal year. I want to assure you that HRM is not taking both the increase in assessment and then increasing the tax rate on top of that. In plain English, HRM sets a target for the average tax bill increase, not the rate increase. This means Council votes on the per home impact, not the rate. The rate is then set to match the tax bill increase. I wrote a short blog explaining how the tax rate is arrived at. You can read it here: www.wayemason.ca/taxrate

Council is scheduled to do a final review and approval of the 2022/23 budget on April 12th.

EMERGENCY ACCOMMODATIONS IN HRM

The Halifax Regional Municipality recognizes that all residents deserve a home. While the province is responsible to lead addressing homelessness in all NS municipalities, the Halifax Regional Municipality also has an important role to play in supporting the province, and is committed to applying resources to support efforts aimed at helping to address homelessness in the Halifax region.

In addition to funding provided during 2021 to help unhoused individuals in our region, on January 11th, 2022, Regional Council approved an additional \$1.2 million in spending to purchase and install modular units at the Halifax and Dartmouth sites, as well as address suitable temporary housing to address needs of unhoused residents.

The **Dartmouth site is on Alderney Drive**, near Church Street. The municipality has finalized its work to provide bedroom spaces at the Dartmouth modular unit site, including commissioning work to ensure all systems are operating properly and safely.

Now that the Dartmouth site is complete, HRM has shifted its focus on completing the Halifax modular unit site.

The Halifax site is located on a portion of the parking area of the Centennial Pool. Six modular units, an accessible unit and a number of support units, for a total of nine units, will be installed. Based on single occupancy, this site will be able to accommodate 38 individuals. The municipality continues to work with partners to complete the work as quickly as possible. As with the Dartmouth site, exact timing for occupancy is dependent upon the province, which is responsible for determining placement of individuals and providing wrap-around services onsite through a contracted service provider.

The municipality has provided some of the crisis accommodation funding approved by Regional Council to a coalition of 11 community service providers for hotel stays to support those experiencing homelessness.

In conjunction with service providers, the municipality is also directly covering the cost of hotel rooms for some individuals.

There are now also temporary overnight shelters available on a nightly basis until March 31st for those experiencing homelessness.

2022/23 DISTRICT CAPITAL GRANT APPLICATIONS - NOW OPEN



While COVID restrictions are largely going away, I've taken the difficult decision to not try and rush into a face-to-face Participatory Budgeting (PB) process this year.

It's already getting late to do the full PB process, and the community groups do best when they get the money as early in the construction season as possible. I also worry if we go for a full public process and vote in May or June it may get derailed if we have cases spike. So once again this year, residents and community nonprofit groups in District 7 will be invited to apply for a District Capital Funding grant. There are two project streams – a big projects category that funds up to \$10,000 and a small project category that will fund up to \$5,000 or less.

District Capital Funds are for permanent projects that provide publicly accessible benefits in the community and that provide widespread community benefit. Priority is given to projects that are intergenerational or focused on youth or seniors, and which work to address equity, inclusion, and systemic racism in our community. Projects must provide the broadest public benefit, and meet all HRM policies and guidelines.

In late May, Victoria and I will review the applications and announce the successful applicants. Deadline for submission is Monday May 30, 2022. For more information about applications, and past successful applicants, please visit **www.wayemason.ca/pb**

MUNICIPALITY LAUNCHES AFRICVILLE VISIONING PROCESS



Regional Council has directed municipal staff to work with community partners on an Africville Visioning Process. The visioning process will help

proactively address historic wrongs and establish a long-term vision for Africville, rather than engaging the African Nova Scotian (ANS) community only when other project priorities arise in the area.

The Process would consist of three phases:

• **Phase one** will consist of a public engagement process in partnership with Africville descendants, Africvillefocused organizations and community partners that will inform the outcomes of the visioning process. Once this is completed, a report will be presented to Regional Council. • **Phase two** will entail developing an action plan to support the visioning, based on what has been learned through the engagement process.

• **Phase three** will be an analysis and review of the process and the identification of any further actions that may need to be taken by all those engaged in the overall visioning exercise. This may include re-engagement with Phase One public participants.

Proactively working with the ANS community to address impacts of the Africville expropriation will assist with addressing long-standing discrimination and fostering positive working relationships between the ANS community, specifically Africville, and the municipality.

Developing a comprehensive master plan for the use and development of the former Africville lands and surrounding area, including potential changes to the transportation network, park spaces and new development opportunities (non-profit and private), with input from the Africville community, will demonstrate the municipality's commitment to continuing to work with the ANS community.
