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# 2024/25 BUDGET UPDATE



On January 24<sup>th</sup>, municipal staff returned to the Budget Committee with changes to the proposed 2024/25 budget that will lower the residential tax burden from 9.7 per cent to 8.9 per cent.

The proposed increase includes a residential municipal tax rate increase of 2.0 per cent. This amounts to approximately \$205 annual tax increase for the average residents.

The municipality is facing ongoing inflationary pressures and population growth, all causing significant cost increases in the 2024/25 Municipal Budget. This tax bill increase would allow all municipal services, projects and initiatives to continue as planned and budgeted for in past years.

Any reduction below 8.9 per cent may mean a reduction or loss in municipal services, or the delay of municipal projects and initiatives. Reminder, the 8.9 per cent is a starting point for futher budget discussions.

## **PROPERTY ASSESSMENTS**



The Property Valuation Services Corporation (PVSC) collects and analyzes sales and financial data to determine property values for each property in Nova Scotia. The <u>Property Assessment Notice</u> you receive each January shows the estimated value of your property one year ago, on January 1<sup>st</sup>, based on market sales and financial data. It also reflects the characteristics and physical state of your property on December 1<sup>st</sup>, one month before your Property Assessment Notice is mailed.

2024 property assessments are based on sales and financial data and reflect a market value as of January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023, and the physical state of properties as of December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023, including new

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construction, renovations, demolitions, and impacts from natural disasters.

This year's rate for the provincial government's Capped Assessment Program (CAP) is 3.2 per cent. The CAP rate reflects the annual Consumer Price Index (CPI) for Nova Scotia as confirmed by the Province. The CAP limits the annual increase in taxable assessment for eligible residential properties to no more than the CPI rate for the year. About 68 per cent of residential assessments, 415,576 property accounts, qualify for CAP for 2024.

PVSC mailed over 645,000 Property Assessment Notices to Nova Scotia property owners on January 9, 2024.

Property owners can view detailed information on their assessment by accessing their "My Property Report" on the Property Valuation Services
Corporation website. Use your Assessment Account Number and PIN access number to see your information. To obtain a PIN number, phone 1.800.380.7775.

What do I do with my assessment notice? It is not necessary to do anything with it if you agree with the assessed value. If, however, you believe the assessed value is not a reasonable estimate then you can contact the PVSC at 1.800.380.7775 or follow the instructions on the back of your Notice of Assessment if you wish to appeal.

Assessment Appeals must be received by PVSC before midnight on February 8<sup>th</sup>. Signed appeal forms can be submitted by email, mail, or fax. For more information about the process and timeline, click here.



## HOUSING ACCELERATOR FUND

The Halifax region is experiencing an urgent housing shortage.

High interest rates, rapid population growth and supply shortages have contributed to this lack of housing.

As part of the <u>Housing Accelerator Fund</u>, the municipality is collaborating with partners and other levels of government in a national effort to support housing. The municipality is proposing



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updates to planning policies to enable more density and flexible housing types in residential areas. Public feedback on the proposed changes can be provided until February  $16^{th}$ .

# ICE THICKNESS TESTING DISCONTINUED



The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents that it will no longer conduct the <u>ice</u> thickness testing

program.

Over the last number of years, there has been a decline in the number of days available for skating. Based on these changed climate patterns, including rapidly fluctuating temperatures, ice thickness testing is no longer feasible.

We realize that some residents may wish to continue skating on lakes, and there may occasionally be times when it is safe to do so.

Residents are asked to take safety precautions for themselves and their families by avoiding any further recreation activities on frozen lakes and ponds, including walking, snowmobiling, and skating.

Residents are reminded that the Canadian Red Cross recommends that ice be at least 15 cm thick for individual skating, and at least 20 cm thick for group skating. Extreme caution is advised in areas where streams flow into and out of lakes. It is also important to note that ice conditions may vary over the entire surface of lakes and are subject to change with weather conditions. ## CIRCUS CIRCLE PROGRAM



<u>Circus Circle</u> is Halifax Circus's outreach program for youth in difficulty. Circus Circle has been operating non-stop for over a decade, four times a week in 3 different locations so youth can more easily access the programs. There's no cost to the youth so there are no barriers for them to attend.

Circus Circle assists troubled youth better their lives through the discipline and self-confidence that come with developing and mastering circus skills such as juggling, unicycling and balance work, aerials, acrobatics and more. The teachers share their joy of performing and help youth learn in a safe and supportive environment.

Circus Circle is based on the Cirque du Monde, the very successful circus outreach programs of the Cirque du Soleil. Circus Circle was developed by Mike Hirschbach who worked for the Cirque for several years as a performer, and then as a Trainer

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of Trainers for Cirque du Monde in Canada, the U.S. and Africa.

At a December 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023 ceremony in Ottawa, ON, Governor General Mary Simon presented Mr. Hirschbach with the Meritorious Service Medal (Civil Division) for starting the Circus Circle outreach program in 2005: a safe space for youth affected by homelessness, street life, addiction and mental illness. Unique to Atlantic Canada, it allows participants to experience positive and creative recreation, learn new skills and build selfconfidence, all while establishing meaningful connections and increasing resilience. Congratulations Mike!

Most youth will take the life skills they learn through social circus – discipline, trust, renewed confidence and contact with others – and apply them in their chosen directions. This may be a return to school, or contact with estranged families, or a commitment to social change and to helping others in similar circumstances.

# 2022-2023 HALIFACT ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT

Regional Council has received the annual report for <u>HalifACT</u>: <u>Acting on Climate Together</u>. This is the municipality's long-term climate action plan to reduce emissions and enhance resiliency to a changing climate, while also promoting social equity and economic development. It was approved unanimously by Regional Council on June 23, 2020,

and is one of Canada's most ambitious climate action plans.

HalifACT contains three themes of action:

- 1. Decarbonized and Resilient Infrastructure
- 2. Prepared and Connected Communities
- 3. Governance and Leadership

Within these, there are 17 subareas and 46 actions that are necessary to meet the targets established in the plan. HalifACT addresses the municipality's climate emergency declaration put forward by Regional Council in January 2019 and aligns with the 1.5°C pathway recommended by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

Acting quickly and effectively to address the climate emergency is complex and cannot be accomplished in isolation. HalifACT is a community plan, requiring not only Halifax Regional Municipality, but all major stakeholders and residents of the Halifax Region to collaborate and take collective action.

#### POLICE CADET RECRUITMENT



Halifax Regional Police (HRP) is launching a recruitment campaign for its 2025 cadet class,

which follows on the success of the last three HRP Police Science Program classes. The next HRP

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Police Science Program is scheduled to begin in the fall of 2024. Applications close on February 28<sup>th</sup>.

"We encourage candidates who represent the diversity of our community, who are compassionate and want to make a positive difference in the lives of those we serve to apply," says Halifax Regional Police Chief Don MacLean.

The program will be based at the Halifax Regional Police Training School in Dartmouth, which is a recognized private career college by the Nova Scotia Department of Labour and Advanced Education. Successful applicants will become cadets in a 38-week police training program that prepares cadets to become police officers with HRP.

Regional Council has endorsed the proposed direction in the <u>Culture and Heritage Priorities Plan</u>.

Sharing our Stories: Halifax Regional Municipality's Culture and Heritage Priorities Plan is a comprehensive strategy aimed at promoting and preserving the diverse, cultural heritage of the Halifax region. The plan outlines a set of 44 actions that will help to build a more inclusive, diverse, and

vibrant cultural community through focused investment, program development, service delivery and ongoing community engagement. The plan's actions will provide high-level guidance in budget and business planning across municipal departments in the areas of culture and heritage programming and will directly inform the 2023 review of the Regional Municipal Planning Strategy.

One of the main objectives of the plan is to expand and improve the representation of equity-seeking groups across the municipality, such as Mi'kmaq, African Nova Scotian, Acadian, 2SLGBTQ+, persons with disabilities, and immigrants and newcomers. Engagement with these communities led directly to the development of actions that will enhance the municipality's approach to diversity and inclusion throughout its programs and services. 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# PARKS & RECREATION SUMMER STAFF RECRUITMENT


The Halifax Regional Municipality has launched recruitment efforts for casual Parks & Recreation summer staff positions.

#### SNOW REMOVAL STANDARDS

# **Land Acknowledgement**

The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmaq people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People.

Halifax is committed to strengthening its relationship with Indigenous communities and honouring the significant contributions of Indigenous peoples. Another way the municipality has demonstrated this is by formalizing the official Land Acknowledgement:

"The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmaq people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People."

Historically, a Land Acknowledgment is a traditional practice shared amongst Indigenous groups to recognize the Indigenous land and territory they are visiting. Making a respectful Land Acknowledgement now, remains a way to express gratitude and respect to Indigenous peoples for being stewards of the land we live and work on. It is a crucial step in reconciliation.

In Nova Scotia, we are all Treaty People; with that comes roles and responsibilities.
