2023/24 Budget at a Glance	
OPERATING BUDGET	\$979.4M
CAPITAL PLAN	\$333.3M
AVERAGE RESIDENTIAL TAX BILL INCREASE	5.9%
MUNICIPAL RESIDENTIAL TAX RATE DECREASE	0.794 TO 0.760

On April 25th, Regional Council ratified the 2023 / 24 Municipal Operating and Capital Budgets. The average residential tax bill is increasing by 5.9 per cent. The average single-family home tax bill will increase by \$128 in 2023/24 to a total of \$2,288. Due to the increase in property assessment values, the municipal residential tax rate will decrease from 0.794 to 0.760.

A new [commercial taxation policy](#) came into effect on April 1st, changing the way that commercial property taxes are calculated going forward. Geographical tax boundaries for commercial properties will change from the previous urban, suburban and rural areas to one of five new tax areas, which are listed in [Administrative Order 2022-003-ADM, Respecting Commercial Property Taxation in Certain Areas of the Municipality](#). As well, for each tax area, rates will vary by assessed value of the property, within three tiers of assessment. The rates for each tier and tax area will be updated on halifax.ca/taxrates.

We're investing in critical areas such as transportation, public safety, infrastructure management and addressing climate change. By doing so, we're creating a foundation for sustainable growth across our region. We've allocated significant funding towards improving our public transportation system, making it more accessible and efficient for all residents. This budget also includes provisions to develop affordable housing, which will help ensure our residents can access quality, low-cost housing.

Furthermore, we're prioritizing public safety with funds allocated to the creation of a new Community Safety business unit, as well as additional funding for Halifax Regional Fire & Emergency services.

This budget will allow the municipality to deliver services that positively impact the daily lives of residents today and into the future.

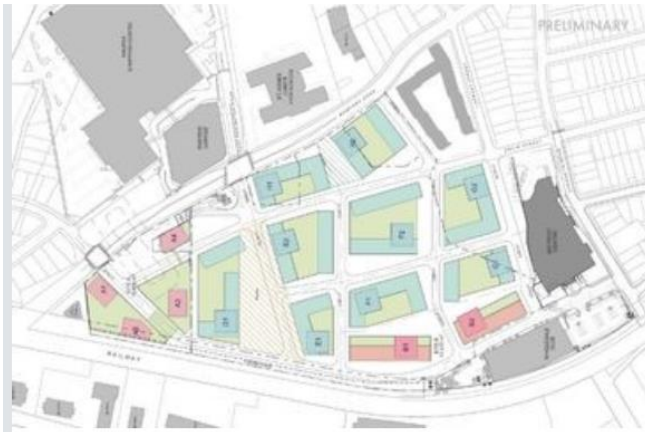

WEST END MALL ANNEX DEVELOPMENT



The West End Mall Annex is designated a Future Growth Node (FGN). The planning process will address what is needed for a new complete community through a neighbourhood plan for the entire area. This will include new roads, parks, pathways, mixed

housing, and any other amenities. Policies will be drafted for the municipal plan to guide development which will enable property owners within the FGN to apply for development agreements.

ROBIE STREET TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURE

Location: Robie Street (south bound), from Cunard Street to Quinpool Road

Date: Tuesday, May 2nd to Friday, May 12th

Time: 24/7

Work details: This work is related to the installation of underground infrastructure for the development at 6015 Quinpool Road.

Traffic impacts:

- Motorists, cyclists and Halifax Transit will detour via Cunard, North Park, Trollope and Summer streets and Veterans Memorial Lane
- Pedestrians will maintain access via Robie Street sidewalks on the east side of the road (along the Halifax Commons)
- Halifax Transit will be temporarily closing the three south bound bus stops between Cunard Street and Quinpool Road on the west side of Robie Street

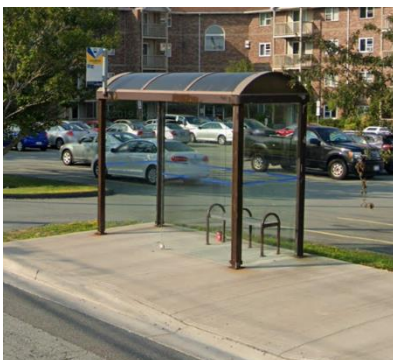
- A temporary bus stop will be placed on the south side of Cunard Street between Robie Street and North Park Street
- Residents should expect delays and are asked to use alternative routes whenever possible.

BUS STOP IMPROVEMENTS - DISTRICT 9



As part of the bus stop improvement program, and to address accessibility at bus stops, construction is

planned at stops within District 9 as outlined in the adjacent table. The work typically includes installation of a concrete pad between the sidewalk and the curb or replacement of the shelter. Please refer to the [municipal website](#) for more information.

Quick Start Guide

1. Download the Litterati app from the [Apple App Store](#) or the [Google Play Store](#) and claim your account
2. Sign up for an HRM clean up [challenge](#)
Join code: CLEANHRM or 542071
3. Clean up & take photos.
4. Upload your photos via wi-fi.
5. Tag your photos in the gallery after uploading.

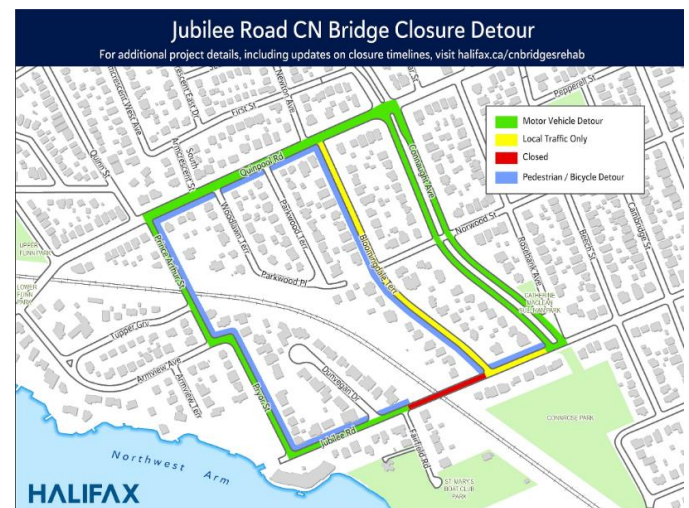

CN RAIL BRIDGE – JUBILEE ROAD



Work on Jubilee Road began in April 2023.

The work includes the rehabilitation of the arch bridge structure, as well as the full replacement of the paved surface, railing and the sidewalks, as well as water and sewer work by Halifax Water. The municipality continues to work

closely with CN and Halifax Water to ensure proper planning and coordination.

The nature of the work requires that a small section of Jubilee Road be closed to all vehicles, cyclists, and pedestrians. Access to the neighbourhood, including the St. Mary's Boat Club, is available from Quinpool Road via Prince Arthur Street. HALIFAX REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY'S LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Land Acknowledgement

The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmaq people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People.

Halifax is committed to strengthening its relationship with Indigenous communities and honouring the significant contributions of Indigenous peoples. Another way the municipality has demonstrated this is by formalizing the official Land Acknowledgement:

"The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmaq people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People."

Historically, a Land Acknowledgment is a traditional practice shared amongst Indigenous groups to recognize the Indigenous land and territory they are visiting. Making a respectful Land Acknowledgement now, remains a way to express gratitude and respect to Indigenous peoples for being stewards of the land we live and work on. It is an important step in reconciliation.

In Nova Scotia, we are all Treaty People; with that comes roles and responsibilities.
