COMMUNITY CORNER

Caldwell Road - Phase 2:

There has been a delay in the construction of the second phase of the Caldwell Road recapitalization project. HRM is waiting on NS Power for the relocation of the power poles. We do not yet have an ETA on this.

Astral Drive:

Astral has been slated for the next recapitalization project in District 4 as it is in poor condition. There is discussion with TPW staff as to the timing of this project along with phase 2 of Caldwell Road (which is waiting on the relocation of the power poles by NS Power). The discussion is regarding which project to move forward in 2025 -More information to come on this.

Ross Road Intersection:

We are still waiting for the negotiations to conclude to move ahead with the realignment plans of Ross Road with the Lake Major intersection. The long-term capital budget has \$3 million slated for the 27/28 fiscal year — however, this is subject to change. I will update community as more information becomes available to share.

Special Planning Areas:

This past summer the province announced two Special Planning Areas (SPAs) in District 4 –

1226 Cole Harbour Road - Approximately 511 residential units & 144 bedrooms (long-term care facility).

Westphal Urban Reserve Lands - Approximately 12,000 to 18,000 units.





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These two areas are part of 15 total SPAs in the Halifax Regional Municipality. The intention is to speed up the housing supply process. Along with the SPA designations, the province has appointed an Executive Panel on Housing which is also intended to speed up the development process by, in essence, taking the place of Community and/or Regional Council processes.

Hwy 7 Road Closure:

Two large culverts are being placed under the Hwy 7 road in East Preston necessitating the full road closure for approximately two weeks, including the closure of transit stops. Thank you to everyone for your patience for being inconvenienced by the extensive detour. Work is being done faster than anticipated and we are hoping for an earlier than expected reopening of the road!

Cole Harbour Road:

Thank you everyone for your continued patience as Cole Harbour Road continued to present traffic and business frustrations for many months. There were a few unexpected delays due to work that had not been previously planned for. Since the asphalt was removed, they decided to take advantage of that fact. It caused a few weeks of extra delay.

This contractor also has several major projects on the go, so we have been sharing crews with those other big projects. The municipality has a lot of major projects on the go with a limited number of contractors who can do the work, so there are staffing challenges that can arise.

Broom Road Development (Provincial Land for Housing Initiative):

There has been a lot of concern from residents regarding the capacity of Halifax Water wastewater treatment and sewer management and the impact that a large development may have on existing capacity. I shared all of your concerns with Halifax Water and requested a response. Halifax water has given permission for me to share with you the response from their Manager of Engineering Approvals:

"There is no formal application for Broom Road that has been submitted to Halifax Water at the moment so it would be too premature to comment. However, as per our Regulations, Section 61. Wastewater and/or Stormwater Service Connections state that:

(2) No person shall make a physical pipe connection to the Wastewater System or the Stormwater System without the prior written approval of the Commission.

(6) In the event of a change of the use of premises, by way of rezoning, re-subdivision, condominium conversion or otherwise. where such use would result in an increased occupancy of the premises, the owner of such premises shall apply to the Commission for a determination as to whether the existing Wastewater or Stormwater Service Connection or Connections is or are, as the case may be, of a suitable size to provide the increased demand required on such Service Connection or Connections and, in respect of such application: (a) the applicant may be required to provide a hydraulic analysis of the proposed Wastewater and/or Stormwater generation and existing downstream system capacity to determine the





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suitability of the Service Connection for a proposed new use.

Section 40. Capacity of Wastewater and/or Stormwater Systems

In the event the Commission deems that the Wastewater and/or Stormwater Systems, or any portion thereof, have insufficient capacity to accept existing or proposed Wastewater and/or Stormwater flows, the Commission may require that the amount of flow which can be Discharged into the Wastewater and/or Stormwater Systems be limited according to such terms and conditions as the Commission may approve.

A capacity analysis on the wastewater infrastructure and hydraulic analysis of the water capacity will be required. The sites overall stormwater management is managed by HRM and NSE requires proposed publicly owned development submissions to balance predevelopment and post-development stormwater runoff."

Sherwood Street Development (Provincial Land for Housing Initiative):

Still waiting on an update from planning staff to let us know the stage this development is at in the process. Each month I will give an update to keep residents informed to the best of my knowledge. In speaking with the developer, Mr. Wilkins has assured me that he will do his best to keep as much natural buffer as possible between his development and the existing properties. Only what is needed to be cut down will be cut down.

HALIFAX RCMP IMPAIRED DRIVING STATISTICS

As Nova Scotia's provincial police, road safety is a top priority for the Nova Scotia RCMP.

For the months of July, August, and September, 274 drivers in the province were charged with impaired-related offences by the RCMP. 234 of those were charged with impaired operation due to alcohol, 12 with a conveyance by drug and 28 for refusal of a demand made by a Peace Officer.

Citizens are asked to call 911 immediately if they see a driver who's driving erratically or unsafely. The Nova Scotia RCMP asks motorists to plan ahead and drive sober.

Each year, Halifax Regional Municipality recognizes the extraordinary contributions of individuals and groups who volunteer in our communities by presenting them with volunteer awards.

TAX RELIEF FOR NON PROFIT **ORGANIZATION**

The municipality is pleased to announce that the Tax Relief for Non-Profit Organizations Program is now accepting applications for 2024-2025. Organizations applying for acceptance into the program (or the addition of another property) must submit a complete application on or before Friday January 31, 2025.

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FALL YARD WASTE TIPS

It's time to clean up the yard and get ready for colder days ahead. Remember leaves and brush, house and garden plant waste, sawdust and wood shavings and any leaves that you do not mulch or backyard compost can go in your green cart or large paper leaf and yard waste bags for collection. Up to 20 bags, 55 lb maximum weight each, are allowed each green cart collection day.

Branches should be tied in armload-sized bundles to a maximum of 5 bundles each collection day. No bundle can exceed 75 lb and no individual piece can be more than 4 feet long or larger than 8 inches in diameter.

<u>Grass clippings</u> will not be collected curbside. <u>Backyard composting</u> is an easy way to return nutrients to your gardens and doesn't require a special container to start.

COGSWELL DISTRICT PROJECT

Construction of the Cogswell District Project is continuing on schedule.

It is anticipated the new Barrington Street between the roundabout and Duke and the new on-street transit hub with 11 new shelters, seating areas and landscaping will open before the end of December.

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WINTER GREEN CART TIPS



When temperatures drop, materials in green carts can freeze and cause issues for both residents and waste haulers. To avoid some of the problems associated with green cart in the winter, our Solid Waste Resources team has some helpful tips:

- Put your green cart out for each collection, even if it's not full. This will give material less time to freeze
- Line the bottom of your green cart with a yard waste bag, boxboard or newspaper
- Place your green cart in a place where the sun can reach it
- Wrap food in paper scraps

Failing to stop for a school bus can result in a first offence fine of \$410 and six points on your license, and most importantly, it could severely impact a person's life.



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YOUTH CLIMATE ACTION FUND RECIPIENTS

Congratulations to the winners of the Youth Climate Action Fund grant program!
Earlier this year, the Halifax Regional Municipality was selected as one of 100 cities internationally to participate in the Youth Climate Action Fund program by Bloomberg Philanthropies and United Cities and Local Governments (UCLG), a youth micro-granting program with values from \$1,000 to \$5,000 USD for youth-led climate projects and initiatives, distributed by the municipality.

The goal is to transform Windmill Road, between Wyse Road and just north of Akerley Boulevard, into a safe, comfortable and enjoyable street for people of all ages and abilities.

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SENIOR SNOW REMOVAL



There's no denying it – winter is on its way. There is a snow removal program available for seniors (ages 65 and older) and persons with disabilities to help ensure safe

access to your home.

The Senior Snow Removal is a YMCA program provided in partnership with Halifax Regional Municipality, and oversees the clearing of front and back steps, walkways, ramps, and access to fuel tanks. Please note that the program does not include driveway clearing.

Those 65+ or persons with disabilities must also meet the following eligibility criteria:

- ✓ The participant must reside in a single dwelling home which is owned or rented;
- ✓ The participant, also including all individuals who live on the premises aged eighteen or older, must not exceed a total gross household income of \$32,000, and;
- √ The participant may not be a landlord.

The Senior Snow Removal operates on a first-come, first-serve basis. When maximum capacity is reached, the program will come to a close and individuals will be placed on a waitlist.

HOUSING AND HOMELESSNESS UPDATE

The Halifax Regional Municipality is committed to treating people experiencing homelessness in our public spaces with dignity while working to find ways to best support them within our capacity and scope as a municipality. Two additional shelter villages will be opening on Thomas Raddall Drive and Bancroft Lane. These shelter villages will have 24/7 support from trained professionals, on-site and surveillance security and the municipal services such as garbage collection. These initiatives, along with the tiny home project, will provide 150 new spaces for people experiencing homelessness. We will continue to work with the Province to transition people sleeping rough outdoors to appropriate sheltering options.

URBAN DESIGN AWARD SUBMISSIONS



The Halifax Regional Municipality is calling for submissions to the 2025 Urban Design Awards – a celebration of urban design excellence that occurs every two

years. To qualify for an award, projects must have been completed after January 1, 2020, and meet the criteria for one of the nine categories. The submission deadline is February 10, 2025 and the award ceremony will take place on Monday, May 26, 2025.
