1. Age



1921, from the diaries of Harry I. Mathers

- Harry Isaac Mathers I purchased two adjacent lots from John M. Geldert in 1919 and 1920
- He commissioned architect Allison Graham Creighton and carpenter and contractor St. Clair Alexander Hiltz
- The historic building permit for the dwelling was issued in May of 1920
- His diaries indicate he moved from 39 Chestnut Street to 250 Jubilee Road on February 24, 1921

I. H. Mathers Ltd. Shipping Agents

- Founded by Isaac Henry Mathers (b.1845 d.1932), an immigrant from Newry, Northern Ireland, who came to Halifax with his wife, Kathleen, and son, Harry, and established a shipping agents in 1872
- The firm is active today as a shipping logistics firm and is still led by the Mathers family





2a. Historical Importance [Historical Relationships]



Harry Isaac Mathers I (1870-1945)

- Joined his father's firm in 1890 and took over as President in 1906
- Expanded into exports of lumber, pulp, salt, & canned lobster, plus imports from the Caribbean
- Operated mills and factories across Nova Scotia
- Served as Russian, Danish, and Norwegian consul and received two knighthoods
- Commissioned the subject dwelling, which he named "The Red Gables", and resided there from 1921 until his death in 1945


Harry Isaac Mathers II (1915-1980)

- Harry Isaac Mathers I died in 1945, and the role of President of I.H. Mathers & Son Ltd. passed to his son Harry Isaac Mathers II
- He acquired 84 freighter vessels after WWII, the largest freight fleet in Canada
- He expanded operations into shipbuilding, stevedoring, and marine insurance
- Harry Isaac Mathers II died in 1980 and the role of President passed to his son Harry Isaac Mathers III



3. Significance of Architect / Builder

- Architect: Allison Graham Creighton
- Resided at the Evergreen
 Estate [now the Dartmouth
 Heritage Museum]












3. Significance of Architect / Builder




- Builder: St. Clair Alexander Hiltz
- Resided at 5731-33 McCully Street [formerly 13 McCully Street]



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4a. Architectural Merit [Construction Type]



- Balloon-frame construction
- Built atop an early poured concrete foundation
- Stucco and wood faux halftimbering, rare in Nova Scotia







4b. Architectural Merit [Style]









Character-defining elements are as listed in the Staff Report, but most notably include:

- Tudor-revival style with steeply pitched roof and intersecting gables
- Stucco and wood faux half-timbering
- Windows with many small panes
- Prominent chimneys and gabled dormers
- Unique rear bay window, second-storey balcony, and flanking sunrooms





5. Architectural Integrity



Photo of the subject dwelling, referred to as "Red Gables", in 1921, from the diaries of Harry I. Mathers

- Rectangular layout is unchanged and nearly all original character defining elements remain intact
- Two notable changes:
 - Original slate roof, as specified in the building permit, has been replaced with asphalt shingles (or possibly was never slate at all)
 - Flanking porches have been enclosed as sunrooms (the sunrooms are Standard 2 character-defining elements)



6. Relationship to Surrounding Area


- Part of the John M. Geldert lands
- Built during a period of expansion westward
- Proximity to other registered heritage properties







6. Relationship to Surrounding Area



Dennis House [1884], situated diagonally opposite 6484 Jubilee Road



Surrounding contributing [unregistered] heritage opposite 6484 Jubilee Road

- Complements the surrounding registered and contributing [unregistered] heritage buildings on Jubilee Road
- Stands out for its uncommon and exemplary Tudor-revival style and its corner placement
