- 10.1 Correspondence
- 10.1.1 Correspondence from Joanne Lamey, with regard to plastics accumulation in the Baker Drive area.

The Legislative Assistant indicated that the Municipal Clerk's Office received correspondence dated January 12, 2018 from a member of the public relating to the accumulation of plastics in and around the Baker Drive area. The Legislative Assistant noted that the correspondence was circulated to members of the Standing Committee.

- 10.3 Presentations
- 10.3.1 Heritage Gas Update on Current Natural Gas Projects & Projects to Reduce GHG Emissions in HRM Heritage Gas Limited

The following was before the Standing Committee:

• Correspondence titled "Reducing GHG Emissions in HRM with Natural Gas," dated January 2018.

Derek Estabrook, Vice President, Heritage Gas, and John Hawkins, President, Heritage Gas, gave a presentation to the Committee on the natural gas projects completed by Heritage Gas in 2017, their plans for 2018, and some of the long-term opportunities that they are evaluating to help reduce Green House Gas emissions in HRM.

Councillor Zurawski expressed his concerns that the presentation did not adequately highlight the potentially serious environmental risks associated with natural gas.

The Chair thanked Derek Estabrook and John Hawkins for their presentation.

10.3.2 Proposal for a Plastic Bag Ban - iMatter Halifax

The following was before the Standing Committee:

• Correspondence from Lilian Barraclough, dated January 25, 2018.

Lilian Barraclough, iMatter Youth Program Facilitator, and Cameron Yemen, provided the Standing Committee with a presentation on the environmental case for banning plastic bags in HRM. The presenters encouraged Regional Council to take the lead on finding creative alternatives to plastic bag use.

The Chair thanked Lilian Barraclough and Cameron Yemen for their presentation, and encouraged them, and other youth in the Municipality, to continue to petition for action on this issue.

On the request of members of the Committee, Matthew Keliher, Manager of HRM Solid Waste Resources, to provide the Standing Committee with a brief update on film plastics management within the Municipality. They explained that 100 tons of film plastic have been landfilled as the materials were becoming a health and safety hazard. HRM Solid Waste Resources did not have the capacity to move and store the materials in the interim while an alternative use or disposal method is identified.

The Chair thanked Matthew Keliher for providing the Standing Committee with an update.

10.3.3 Presentation on Halifax Solid Waste Youth Engagement Strategy – *Management Without Borders, Dalhousie*

The following was before the Standing Committee:

- Correspondence from Emily Davis and Eryn Forester, dated January 25, 2018;
- Presentation titled "Recycling & Re-Using Ideas: A youth engagement strategy for HRM Solid Waste Resources."

Emily Davis, Eryn Forester, and Alias Allmer, Dalhousie Graduate Students with the Management Without Boarders Program, provided the Standing Committee with a presentation on their best practices research to determine a feasible youth engagement strategy for Halifax Solid Waste Resources.

The presenters outlined the methodology of their research, explaining that they undertook a jurisdictional scan, and developed an online survey targeting HRM youth. The presenters outlined their recommendations arising from the research, with the central recommendations focusing on a phased implementation of a Halifax Solid Waste Resources Youth Action Committee.

Responding to guestions from the Standing Committee, the presenters provided the following feedback:

- With regards to the scope of the mandate of a Youth Action Committee, they did not want to be too prescriptive of the type of issues that participants could engage in, as they believe that a board mandate would be more effective than a top-down approach.
- The presenters noted that their research did not specifically touch upon what level of government would be most effective at engaging youth on such issues. However, Eryn Forester noted that from the secondary literature studied, there appears to be a greater impact at the Municipal level.

The Chair thanked Emily Davis, Eryn Forester, and Alias Allmer for their presentation and their work with HRM Solid Waste Resources.

11. INFORMATION ITEMS BROUGHT FORWARD

11.1 Halifax Solar City Program Update - Information Report & Presentation

The following was before the Standing Committee:

• Information report dated November 20, 2017.

Adam Hayter, Energy Specialist, HRM Planning and Development, and Kevin Boutilier, HRM Solar City Program Officer, provided the Standing Committee with a presentation and update on the Halifax Solar City Program.

Adam Hayter walked the Committee through the program's Key Performance Indicators ("KPIs"), lessons learned, and the future direction of the program. It was noted during the presentation that a Municipal Solar Electric dataset is scheduled to be released on the HRM Open Data Portal in the near future.

Responding to questions from the Standing Committee, the presenters provided the following feedback:

- Councillors can assist by helping raise community awareness of the Solar City program.
- There are currently 25 Municipal facilities that have these solar systems installed.
- At present, Photovoltaic is the most promising solar technology, as it has gone from \$4 per watt to roughly \$2 a watt.
- With regards to energy storage options, Kevin Boutilier noted that more research and development is needed on battery storage before they can be confident of its commercial viability.
- Toronto is the only other municipal jurisdiction in Canada offering a similar program, although many smaller municipalities are also expressing interest.

The Chair thanked Adam Hayter and Kevin Boutilier for their presentation.

- HRM staff did not directly consult with Halifax Water or Nova Scotia Environment in the development of the report before the Standing Committee.
- The proposed study would look at both geographical areas, as well as the specific sources of the fecal contaminants.
- In terms of a timeline for the study, it was suggested that the Municipality would have results of the study towards the end of 2018, should it be approved.
